Frozen Oysters Survive Unless Roughly Handled

Investigation Shows Interesting Results At Biological Station.

The following article by Mr. M. H. Friedman of the Atlantic Biological Station (Note No. 34.) will be read with much interest.
During a recent investigation of the resistance of shellfish to low temperatures it was found that the oyster (Ostrea virginica) is quite resistant to freezing; for example, oysters frozen at about 24 degrees F. (-5 degrees C.) survived seven weeks storage at that temperature without apparent injury providing that they were not handled roughly when frozen.
It is advisable, therefore, to treat frozen oysters with care. It should be borne in mind that the injury through rough handling is not apparent at once since the shell is not usually cracked; the damage is seen only after the oyster has been thawed.
Oystermen should thaw the frozen oysters before moving them; this may be done by finishing them for some time with cold water or by warming the room in which they are stored. Care should be taken that the warming is gradual since sudden immersion in warm water is highly injurious. Care should also be taken to guard against repeated freezing and thawing of the oysters; if it is found unavoidable to refreeze oysters which have already been frozen and thawed, it is best to allow an interval of more than a day between freezings.
The effect of jarring on frozen oysters probably explains part of the high mortality in shallow water in winter. The shifting of the ice may jar them enough when they are in the ice to dislodge and bury, or crush the shells of others.
