We print in another column Councillor Hooper's explanation in regard to the delay in printing the City accounts. It is not charged that the accounts have been kept back of design or for purposes of concealment. The facts are known that collections have been made of nearly all taxes and that the balance as between revenue and expenditure is on the right side of the ledger. These facts are important and so far satisfactory.

None the less something more is desirable. It is, in our judgment imperative that in the year of the election especially the electors shall have the accounts before them for perusal and consideration some time before they are called to vote. That this has not been the case heretofore can afford no good excuse for the present or the future. If there has been a single improper expenditure, whether small or large the electors are entitled to know it, that the blame may be placed in the proper quarter.

During the past year there were some outlays, notably in regard to the entertainment of prominent visitors which a number of citizens would like to look into. It is now too late to provide a remedy for this year. We believe all will accord to Councillor Hooper and his associates the full benefit of the explanation he has made. His suggestion that the date of the Civic election be changed to April and that legislation to that effect be obtained so as to afford more time for printing the City report is worthy of consideration. That may or may not be the best way of solving the problem, but our citizens are well within their rights in insisting that the City accounts shall be in their hands before they are called to vote in future elections.

At the meeting of the Provincial Alliance a prominent milk vendor was quoted as stating that in pursuance of his daily work he found that under the Prohibitory Law the consumption of milk had considerably increased. This is another demonstration of the fact that suppression of the liquor traffic turns money into other and better channels. The dry goods merchant, the grocer, the baker and the milkman share in this larger distribution of money. And if less whiskey and more milk is used in the average family that is surely a matter for congratulation. Such a change makes for health, wealth, morals, peace and order.

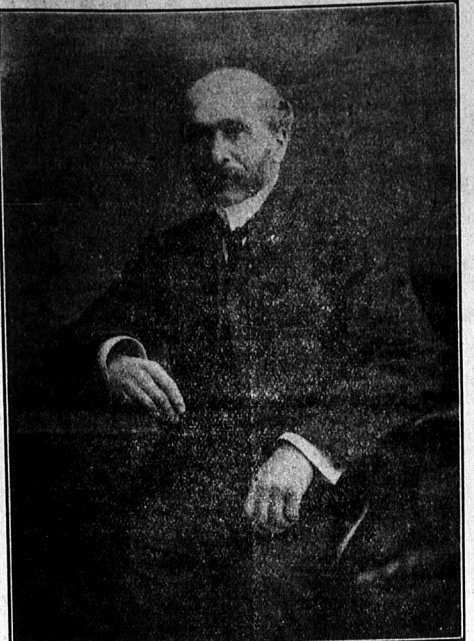
After the election in Prince County the result was telegraphed all over Canada, and as the despatch dated from Charlottetown one of the St. John dailies placed a big headline over it intimating that "Charlottetown would be a dry town" hereafter. This little error has aroused the ire of the Island Farmer, which rises to remark that "there is a section of the Island outside of Charlottetown known as Prince County, the capital of which is Summerside; and the people of this section do not take second place even to Charlottetown—either physically, religiously, morally, mentally or financially." NEW LIGHT ON DARK SUBJECTS

A short time ago we were discussing the tides, with incidental reference to the commonly accepted theory of gravitation. Just now we are confronted with the dictum of Miss Martha Craig, an Irish lady well known in Montreal, we are told, who proceeds to annihilate all the theories as to the natural laws governing the universe. She went northward into the wilderness of Labrador and there had a revelation. Briefly stated Miss Craig's new light on these great questions is as follows:

The principle of gravitation or the attraction of matter is denied, and in its stead Miss Craig places a system of vortices. The sun, the earth, the moon, and all the known constellations each have their own vortex, which holds their particles together by pressure. What is known as the atmosphere, Miss Craig declares to be the vortex, and she further says that, far from being stationary, the atmosphere is in perpetual vortex-like motion.

Again she denies that light and heat come from the sun, because the higher you go the colder it gets. Light and heat, she says, are generated, so far as the world is concerned, by the friction of the vortex on the world's surface coming in contact with solar rays.

We read of thousands in Toronto, Montreal, Winnipeg and other cities being fleeced and held in bondage by the loan sharks. Now, nothing is clearer than that the Parliament of Canada has power to regulate the rate of interest, and ought therefore to provide such additional safeguards as may be needed against usurious extortion.

One Napoleon Noel attempted to persecute another voter at the civic elections in Montreal last week. He was arrested and the Recorder promptly sentenced him on the following morning to two weeks imprisonment and a fine of \$500, or six months additional imprisonment. Prompt punishment of that sort ought to go far towards checking personation.

The decision of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick in the Mabel French case, that a woman is not a person and therefore cannot be admitted to the bar, is now to be applied to a bar of another kind. The Temperance Alliance of St. John are reminded by Rev. W. S. Pritchard that three women in that city hold licenses to sell liquors, which they have no right to hold if a woman is not legally a person. The point is an interesting one, certainly.

THE CITY ACCOUNTS.

Sir,—In this morning's Guardian appears a letter signed "Eagle Eye" re City accounts. Also your comment on same. That perhaps requires some explanation from me. At the meeting held in Ward 5 on Feb'y 1st I thought I gave a satisfactory explanation of the matter in the presence of your reporter who was at the meeting. I may say in the history of Charlottetown the City accounts have only been out once by the first of Feb'y, and considering that the books do not close till the 31st Dec. you cannot get them out much earlier than the 10th Feb'y, which the Council endeavored to do. There were three tenders received for printing the City reports and as has always been the rule the lowest tender was accepted, the work to be completed by the 10th Feb'y. After considerable delay the contractor refused to complete the contract and it was offered to the next lowest tender but owing to the short time to complete the work they refused to accept. Then it was offered to the third tender which was accepted but owing to the delay the work could not be completed before the first of March. The Mayor and Council regret very much that the City reports will not be in the hands of the citizens before election day but under the circumstances it is unavoidable, and I would suggest that in future the Civic elections be held the first April.

and legislation to that effect be secured.

That would give the citizens ample time to fully consider the City accounts. It would also be a better time for holding the elections. Imagine the different candidates for Civic honors canvassing Charlottetown and the electors getting out to vote last Feb'y, if that had been Election year.
