RESULTS THAT COUNT

Mr. MacKenzie King's address in Charlottetown tonight will be a matter of general interest. So far he has raised no new issue, and he has certainly not defined clearly his own position on one issue which, a few months ago, he claimed was of paramount importance.

Wherever Mr. King stands, there is no ambiguity about the position of the Bennett administration, their sincerity in implementing the Ottawa agreements and the success attending the operation of the pacts. Here are some of the results:

- Canada was first in the British market in 1934 in wheat with 35,716,000 cwt., Argentina being second with 35,083,000. The difference in value was: Canada, \$55,263,060; Argentina, \$39,798,540.

- Canada was first in cotton with 4,227,000 cwt., Australia second with 1,927,000, France third with 1,285,000.

- Canada was second in live cattle with 51,373 head, the Irish Free State being first with 458,164.

- Canada was second in bacon with 895,000 cwt., Denmark being first with 4,288,000. In 1932 Canada was in seventh place with 182,000 cwt.

- Canada was first in hams with 180,000 cwt.

- Canada was second in cheese with 52,000 cwt.

- Canada was first in apples with 2,490,000 cwt.

- Canada was first in lobsters with 20,000 cwt. out of a total of 23,000 cwt.

- Canada was first in copper ore with 28,453 long tons. Spain was second with 6,496.

- Canada was third in soft wood lumber with 1,081,000 loads. Canada's supply was nearly five times what it was in 1932.

- Canada was second in undressed hides and skins.

- Canada was first in aluminum, ingots, blocks and so forth with 231,000 cwt., and also in electrolytic copper, crude zinc and non-ferrous metals.

THE X RAY EXAMINATION OF TEETH

When a physician believes that a patient is suffering from such infection, he looks for the likely places where infection is most commonly found. He thus starts with the teeth; then the tonsils, then the bladder, then the intestines and then sinuses adjoining the nose or showing in the face as bumps or pimples.

Dr. Wilbur H. Gilmore in Clinical Medicine and Surgery speaks of the controversy that often occurs between the X ray specialist and the dentist. The patient has been sent to the X ray specialist by the physician and naturally the films and what the X ray specialist finds are referred to the physician. The physician then sends the patient and the films to the dentist with "instructions" as to what he wants the dentist to do.

Dr. Gilmore's suggestion is that the dentist should have in mind the fact that there are two teeth in each jaw, and how well they meet or do not meet for chewing purposes, and so may belittle the X ray films much to the embarrassment of the patient and annoyance of the physician.
