THE FERRY STEAMERS.

We trust that the session of the Legislature, now near its end, will not be permitted to close without some definite announcement that the ferry steamers will be at once thoroughly inspected by competent officials.

The duty ought to have been attended to before the ferries began their season's work. Every day that the uninspected boats ply their routes is one of doubt and uncertainty, if not of serious peril.

VITAL STATISTICS.

We are glad to find the provincial government taking up the question of vital statistics. The Province has been a laggard in this matter though its importance has often been urged in the press, and by medical men and others.

The first enactment will be educational in its effect and no doubt amendments may be suggested by experience in its working.

It would be well if every school-house in the Dominion were possessed of a national flag. A few schools have them, and those which do not should each obtain one.

LOCAL LEGISLATURE.

House met at 10.45. Mr. Campbell asked the chairman of the Stock Farm Commissioners if any of the stock belonging to the Government Farm were exhibited at the exhibitions of Halifax or St. John last autumn.

In reply to Mr. Shaw the C.P. Works laid on the table of the House, the plans and other papers regarding the P. W. College.

In reply to Mr. McKinnon, the Attorney General laid on the table of the House a report of the Scott Act fines.

Mr. John A. McDonald asked the Commissioner of Public Works if it is the intention of the government to pay Mr. John Hickey of Darnley the sum of fifteen dollars, as agreed upon for lands taken by the government.

Mr. Campbell moved in amendment that it be read this day three months. The amendment was lost on division 10-14.

A Bill regarding assignments was read a third time.

Hon. J. R. McLean moved the following resolution. Resolved, that the Government of this Province, have liberty to introduce a Bill this present session of the Legislature authorizing the issue of Debentures in such form and manner as may be deemed proper for the construction of a wing or annex to the Hospital for the Insane at Falconwood, also for the construction of certain steel bridges and for the purchase and construction of other Public Works of a permanent nature, such debentures to run for a period of thirty years and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed three per cent per annum payable semi-annually, and the amount for which such debentures shall be issued, shall not exceed in the whole the sum of twenty-six thousand dollars; and also to make provision for a sinking fund to redeem such debentures by setting apart every year a sum equal to one and a half per cent on the amount of debentures actually issued.

Resolution was adopted on a party vote. House resolved itself into committee Mr. Wise in the chair to consider said resolution. The chairman reported the bill agreed to. A Bill in accordance with said resolution was brought in and read a first time.

A Bill amending the Public Schools Act was read a third time and passed.

A Bill regarding the profession of Medicine and Surgery was read a third time and passed.

Hon. H. C. McDonald introduced a Bill entitled "An Act to amend an Act to impose a direct tax on certain classes of Traders." Bill was read a first time.

AFTERNOON SESSION. A Bill to alter (and amend) the Act Incorporating the Masonic Hall Company was read a third time and passed.

Hon. Mr. Farquharson moved the House into committee, Mr. Forbes in the chair to consider a Bill entitled an Act to amend an Act to authorise the Government of P. E. Island to construct a building to be used for the Prince of Wales College and Normal school. Bill reported agreed to without amendments.

Hon. H. C. McDonald moved that the House resolve itself into committee to consider a Bill to amend 61st Vic-

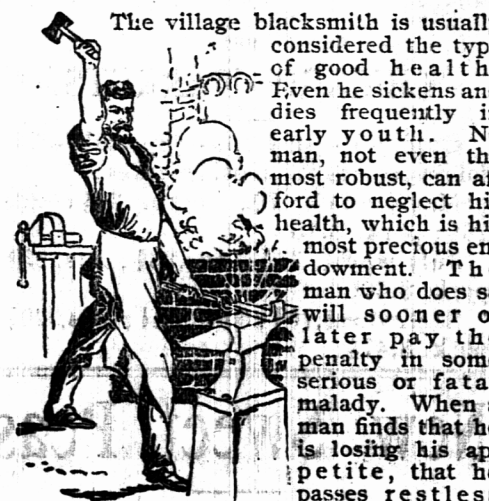
EVENING SESSION.
