THE GUARDIAN LOCAL NEWS

THE P. E. I. militia will go into camp on June 27th.

THOMAS HOGAN is in Georgetown looking after J. McQuillan & Co's shipment of pork.

JOHN A. WEBSTER of Webster & McKay, is visiting his parents at St. Peter's. He will return in a few days.

THERE will be no crossing from the mainland by the capes today all the ice-boats being still on this side.

EDWARD WALKER, aged 84, a prominent lumbering man of Richibucto, well known in this city, died several days ago.

No. 1 Co., C. A., will accept the challenge of Printers to a match game of hockey. The Barbers have also signified their acceptance.

It is probable that the Legislature after its session this morning will adjourn for about four weeks pending the election in St. Peter's District.

Owing to there not being a quorum present the meeting of the City Council to have been held last night to consider the electric light question was postponed.

The Truro team defeated by the Abegweit Friday night 4 to 3 in the Metropolitan Rink. Truro defeated Sackville, Champions of the N. B. league by a score of 5 to 2.

The teams, with the mails that were on board the train at Travers left yesterday at 1:30 for Bonshaw en route to the city. It was not probable that they would reach there last night owing to the storm.

SEVEN Government boats left Cape Travers at 11:30 yesterday for the mainland carrying 20 bags mails and one passenger. One opposition boat had five passengers. All were compelled to return to the island in the afternoon at 2:30, after going about 2 1/2 miles through water and lolly.

ONE of the biggest cuttings on the P. E. I. Railway is about a mile and a half east of Hunter River. For over 600 feet the cutting ranges all the way from twenty to twenty-six feet high and in shovelling it out the snow had to be thrown three stages before the top was reached. And this cutting is entirely filled in again.

WHILE driving from the Provincial Building at the opening of the Legislature yesterday the Governor with his Secretary were precipitated into the snow near Queen Square School. The horses became somewhat fractious but were soon quieted. The accident was owing to the shovelled track partly filling in.

COURIER McNEVIN arrived at Bonshaw last night at eight o'clock and reported a very hard experience in travelling from the city. He says it will be impossible to leave for the city again today before ten o'clock when it is expected that the roads will be partly broken. It is therefore probable that there will be mail before late this afternoon.

THE Charlottetown Foundry & Machine Company has just completed a boiler for Charles McFarlane, engineer of the ferry boat Hillsboro, which has been constructed of special strength to stand a working of 200 lbs per square inch. It was successfully tested yesterday to the great pressure of 300 lbs per square inch without sign of leak or other weakness thereby demonstrating this up-to-date Company's ability to do first-class work. They also have under construction several boilers for lobster factories and mills throughout the island.
