Detroit Takes Stranglehold On American League Flag

Newsom Pitches Tigers To Twin Victory Over White Sox 10-9 And 3-2

DETROIT, Sept. 25 (AP)—Detroit Tigers, with Louis (Duke) Newsom man of the hour, fought to a pair of victories over Chicago White Sox today as they gained a full two-game advantage over Cleveland Indians in the American League race.

The Tigers took the opener 10-9 in 10 innings and the second game 3-2, and Newsom, their 32-year-old right-hander, scored both victories.

Newsom gained the 20-victory mark for the third successive season in the first game after two innings of valiant relief duty. He went the full distance in the second contest for his 21st victory, more victories than he has ever before scored in his long and colorful major league career.

Need Only One Win
 The Tigers, who conclude their season with the Indians in single games Friday, Saturday and Sunday, need win only one of them to beat out the Tribesmen.

At Cleveland, big Al Mihar pumped a hypodermic into the Indians lagging pennant hopes with a 4-2 football-weather triumph over St. Louis Browns. It was the Indian southpaw's 17th victory.

A two-run single by Ben Chapman, Indians' left fielder, kept the Tribe in the league race.

Power Plant In Detroit's Outfield

NEW YORK, Sept. 25 (AP)—The outfield should be the power plant of a baseball club and Detroit Tiger's outfield has power to spare.

The experiment that switched Hank Greenberg from first base to left field had a jolting effect on the American League. It made room for both Greenberg and first baseman Rudy York in the Tigers' lineup and sparked Detroit to the top of the circuit with the best batting average in the major league. The punch is exemplified by Greenberg with a .340 batting average, 40 homers and 149 runs batted in.

Therefore, because of big Hank's presence, if for no other reason, the Tigers' outfield must be considered superior to the fine-fielding patrol of Cincinnati Reds as well as the capable but not brilliant brigade of Cincinnati Indians, who still are struggling for the series nomination.

The difference would have been overwhelming if the Reds had not picked up Jimmy Rippe in August. He is a streaky player, but he's usually hot when the money is on the tablecloth. He batted .310 in two World Series for New York Giants and has hit .308 for the Reds in 31 games he hasn't made a fielding error.

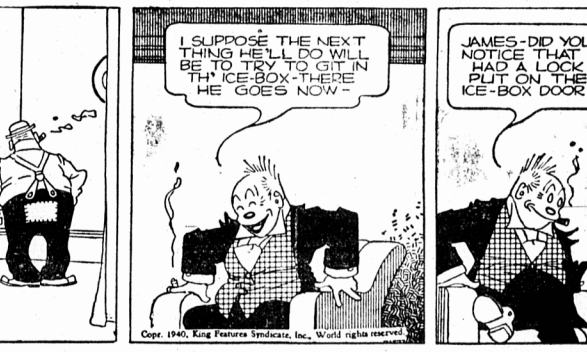

MANY HOUSES USING SOLID GROUND BLOCK

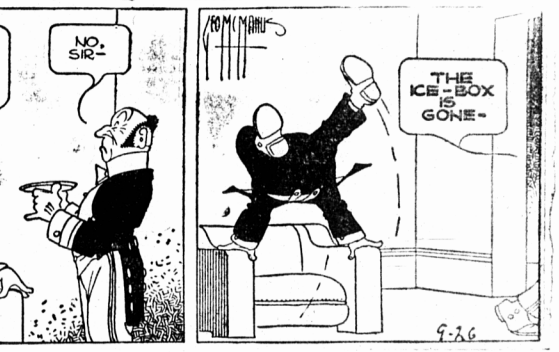
Notable feature of many new houses being built in Canada this year is the use of a solid concrete block for the ground floor. This new building development provides a "fire box" for the basement, making it impossible for fire to spread from the cellar to the upper floor of the house. It consequently reduces insurance costs and provides valuable protection.

Use of concrete for the cellar ceiling and first story floor is made practical through the use of asphalt tile floorings which may be applied directly over a concrete base. This composition material is widely used in Canadian residence, is attractive in color and design and easy to keep clean. It is moisture proof and long wearing. Under this construction method, in addition to reducing fire danger, the householder protects the upper floor from cellar dust, vermin and dampness, the concrete slab providing a suitable armor against these basement invaders.

DIAMOND MEN EYE U. S.

That the United States is destined to become the world's diamond center is the view taken by the heads of one of the biggest diamond mining and trading companies of Johannesburg, South Africa, which has announced that it will form an American corporation in the United States to cut, market and distribute South African diamonds. Antwerp and Amsterdam, formerly the chief diamond centers, are out of the picture, and the Johannesburg diamond men believe that London which now ranks as a center, cannot serve the American market. They hold that the United States and Johannesburg are the only centers available to diamond purchasers. Johannesburg's importance in the American market is growing.
