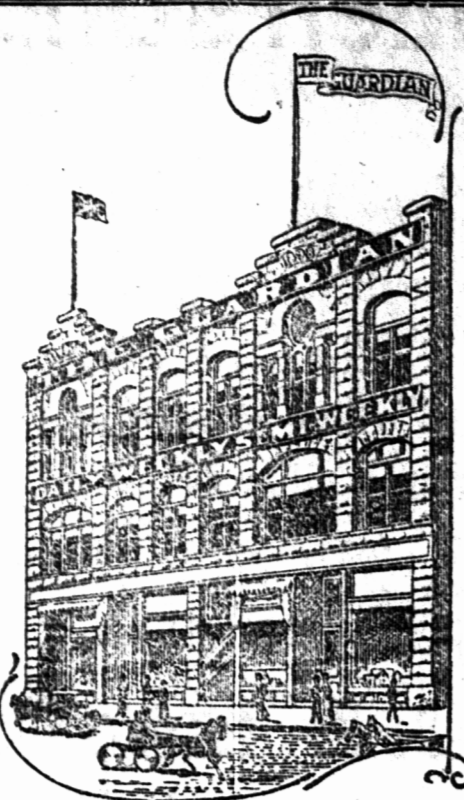

NOT A PARTY QUESTION.

The proposed subsidizing of the Dominion Packing Company is a business proposition to be considered and disposed of on business principles. It is in no sense a party matter. It has been condemned by Liberals and Conservatives alike, not only in this city but from other parts of the Island. The editor of The Guardian has received personal letters and communications from a number of the most prominent Liberals in the Province expressing very strong condemnation of the bargain, and equally strong commendation of our course in the matter. We refer to this phase of the question here and now not in order to take personal credit but to show the general feeling of the community, so far as we have been able to learn it.

The number of prominent Liberals who are either strongly opposed to, or very distrustful of the proposal should induce the Government to pause and reconsider what has been proposed. Every Government is naturally heedful of the desires of its friends. In this case the strong feeling against the proposed action among many Liberals who are prominent in the industry and business of the Island, gives the Government an easy and sufficient pretext for receding from its intended

tion. We are now hopeful that the Executive is not committed so far but that the matter may be re-considered. And we are very hopeful that good results may come of the conference between members of the Executive and the Board of Trade next week.

We know that our farmers and stock-raisers are very distrustful of the proposed arrangement. They fear the introduction of a monopoly that may be able to fix the purchase price of their beef, mutton, poultry and eggs by shutting out the present healthful competition. Consumers likewise fear a monopoly that may, as has been done in other lands, compel them to pay exorbitant prices, without any compensating advantages to the producer. Our shippers, packers, and dealers in meats, eggs and produce are naturally alarmed at the proposed invasion of a combine of outside capitalists specially favored by a Government guarantee of its bonds. Thus, without regard to party, the many important interests that are to be disturbed and possibly overthrown by the new company have taken alarm. We sincerely hope that the Government will give heed to public feeling in this matter, as they can yet do before the public alarm is turned into resentment.

The opposition to the proposed action of the Government is not a partisan opposition and it is not an unreasoning one. It has sound business principles and solid facts as its basis. It cannot be brushed aside, but will grow in volume and intensity if the present scheme is finally adopted and carried into effect. Certainly the country ought not to be committed to new and onerous financial obligations, greatly disturbing to existing enterprises, and fraught with danger to the entire community, when so large a portion of the Government's support is opposed to the proposed action. It is not with divided counsels and in the face of opposition on every hand that so grave and hazardous a new departure should be made. The prudent mariner shortens sail when the storm is about to break, and the Government ought now to heed the storm signals displayed on every hand.

CHARLOTTETOWN.

From An Outsiders View Point.

Mr. Editor.—Many people looking at a map of Canada, fancy that Prince Edward Island is but a small place. And when they are told it is 104 miles long, and has a population of about 120,000 it is rather astonishing. From Point du Chere, a terminus of the Intercolonial Railway, the Island is reached, at Summerside, by the Steamer Northumberland a staunch iron boat, well found in every respect, and ably commanded by Captain Cameron who is a genial sailor and indefatigable in looking after the comfort of his passengers. In this he is ably assisted by Mr. Ryan, the Purser. The trip across takes a little over two and a half hours and is a pleasant one. At Summerside the cars of the P. E. I. Railway are in waiting and start immediately the passengers get aboard. After a run of 48 miles Charlottetown is reached. This place is very prettily situated. In front it has a fine harbor where vessels from different parts arrive constantly during the season. The Plant Line have the "Halifax" and "Olivette" making periodical trips between Boston and there, and one of the most pleasant ways of spending a warm day is to take Steamer Princess and cross over to Pictou a distance of fifty miles. She is a new iron steamer, well equipped and in charge of Captain McLean, who besides being a first class sailor, is a genial hospitable host. His purser Mr. McDonald is very popular and deservedly so while Mr. Smith the steward is the king of criers. It is surprising that more of the residents of the town do not patronize this pleasant day's outing on the water. To a stranger there are many points of interest.
