MINUTES OF THE PRESBYTERY.

At Kensington and within the Presbyterian Church there on Tuesday, August twenty-ninth, nineteen hundred and sixteen, and at ten o'clock forenoon.

At which place and time the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met and was constituted. Mr. G. A. Sutherland Moderator, with whom were present Messrs. (Dr.) Fullerton, Fraser, McNeill, MacHattie, Irvine, Robt. Murray, Lockhart, J. S. MacKay, Stirling, Murchison and McCall, ministers, and Messrs Schurman, Ramsay, Humphrey, Corbett and James, Elders.

The clerk read a letter from Rev. Dr. Shearer re appointment of military chaplains.

At the request of the Moderator Mr. J. H. Fraser took the chair. On motion of the Clerk, Revs. Dr. Archibald and W. I. Green were invited to correspond.

On motion, Messrs. R. Murray and J. H. MacHattie were appointed a committee to examine the session records of Long River and Kensington.

The Clerk laid upon the table a call from the congregation of Wilkie and Scott, Presbytery of Battleford, Saskatchewan, to Rev. G. A. Sutherland, of New London North and Kensington, with accompanying documents, reporting that he had cited the congregation to appear for their interests at this meeting.

Mr. E. Lockhart for the congregation calling and the Presbytery of Battleford forcibly presented the claims of this important field.

Representatives from all sections of Mr. Sutherland's congregation were present and were heard as follows: Messrs. Ramsay, Andrew McLeod, Johnson, Stewart, Laird, McMurdo, McKenzie, Brown and Newton McLeod. They all bore splendid testimony to the faithful and efficient work of the pastor and to the prosperity which the congregation had experienced under his ministry. Special mention was made of Mr. Sutherland's work among the young.

After a brief reply from Mr. Lockhart and an earnest plea from Mr. John Stirling on behalf of the Presbytery and Synod of the Maritime Provinces for the retention of Mr. Sutherland in his present field, on motion of Dr. Fullerton, duly seconded, the call was placed in Mr. Sutherland's hands.

Mr. Sutherland, while conveying his sincere thanks to the congregation and Presbytery for their splendid acknowledgment of his services, yet felt it his duty to accept the call.

On motion of Dr. Fullerton, seconded by Mr. J. S. MacKay, the Presbytery acquiesced in Mr. Sutherland's decision and agreed to grant the translation, instructing Mr. Sutherland to hold himself at the disposal of the Presbytery of Battleford, his present pastorate to terminate toward the end of September.

Both the mover and seconder paid a well deserved tribute to Mr. Sutherland's labors in his own congregation in the Presbytery and in the Synod, and on behalf of the Presbytery expressed deep sympathy with the congregation in the loss of such a faithful and efficient pastor.

On motion, Mr. John Stirling was appointed interim moderator with instructions to declare the pulpit vacant as speedily as possible.

The clerk read the resignation of Rev. J. C. Martin of the pastoral charge of Cardigan. Inasmuch as there was no evidence that the congregation had been cited, on motion the resignation was laid on the table. On motion the Presbytery, at the

request of the Session of Zion Church, agreed to appoint Rev. J. D. Mackenzie, of High River, Alberta, to that congregation for one year, at a stipend of Fifteen hundred dollars.

The Clerk read a petition from certain members of the Hartsville section of the congregation of Strathalbyn, praying for separation of Hartsville from its present congregation and union with Brookfield. Mr. D. McDonald was heard in support of the petition.

On motion of Dr. Fullerton, seconded by the Clerk, the whole matter of rearrangement of the congregations that might be affected by the proposed change was referred to the following committee: Dr. Fullerton, Conventer; Messrs. G. Millar, J. Stirling, J. M. McLeod (St. Peter's Bay) and A. J. McNeill, ministers; and Messrs. A. S. MacKay, D. Schurman, Geo. B. McNutt and the Clerk, Elders, with instructions to proceed with all possible speed and to have power to cite sessions and congregations as they may deem expedient, and further on completion of their report, to call a meeting of Presbytery which shall have power to issue the whole matter.

On motion it was agreed to call a congregational meeting at Covehead for the purpose of moderating in a call on Monday, September eleventh, at seven o'clock evening. Mr. J. H. MacHattie was appointed to preach at Covehead on Sabbath, September third, and Mr. T. A. Wilson on September tenth, with instructions to read notice of such meeting.

The committee appointed to examine the records of Kensington and Long River, reported certain omissions and changes to be made. With these suggestions they recommended that the minutes be attested.

On motion, Mr. J. M. Macleod (St. Peter's Bay) was appointed Moderator for the unexpired term of Mr. G. A. Sutherland.

The Presbytery then adjourned to meet at the call of the Moderator and Clerk, of which public intimation was made and this adjournment closed with the benediction.

ORGANIZATION OF WORK A MIRACLE.

Premier Asquith so Refers to That Done in the Relief of Belgium's Starving.

"A miracle of scientific organization," are the words which Premier Asquith used a short time ago to describe the work accomplished by the Belgian Relief Committee.

"That is, I believe, not an overstatement," said the Premier. "Mr. Hoover, the head of the movement, and those associated with him, have had to provide, and are providing every day, food for over nine millions of people, five millions of whom are practically destitute."

"The enormity of this work is beyond the comprehension of the average person. The amount of money necessary to keep these poor people from death by starvation can only be imagined. At least it is \$100,000 a day."

"That is why the Belgian Relief Committee, 59, St. Peter Street, Montreal, is renewing its appeal to we Canadians,—the more fortunate of little Belgium's allies,—to help feed her hungry women and starving children. Two dollars and fifty cents will keep a Belgian family a month, if the money is sent to the Belgian Relief Committee. Has your two-fifty gone forward?"

Mr. R. McLaughlin so characterizes Germans in letter which he enclosed cheque to Belgian Relief Committee.

Montreal, Aug. Scores of letters containing cheques and contributions varying from ten cents to several thousand dollars are now coming into the offices of the Belgian Relief Committee, 59 St. Peter Street, this city, as a result of the new appeal that is being made for funds.

Here is a characteristic letter from Mr. R. McLaughlin of the McLaughlin Motor Car, Limited, Oshawa, Ont.

"Treasurer Belgian Relief Fund. Dear Sir—

"I enclose my cheque for (\$50.00) fifty dollars for the Belgian Relief Fund. Were it not for these brave people, who held the German bayonet back until France and England made preparation to meet the ravagers of humanity, the Germans would have been in Paris.
