THE OXFORD-CAMBRIDGE BOAT RACE OVER HISTORIC HENLEY COURSE TO-DAY

Crews Will Float To the Line This Afternoon in One of England's Greatest Annual Sport Classics.—Anywhere From Half Million to Million Spectators Will Witness Spectacular Struggle In Great Endurance Race.

LONDON, England, April 5.—Of the many big sport events that are provided annually for Londoners or anyone who cares to visit the metropolis to witness them, there is probably none that is more eagerly looked forward to, draws a larger crowd or provides more thrills in the few minutes that it lasts than does the great University Boat Race, between the ancient rivals Oxford and Cambridge, which will take place on the Thames this afternoon.
