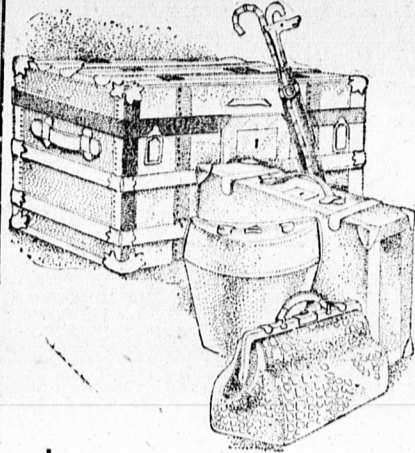

The railway yards of this City present a very lively appearance under the supervision of Mr. Robertson who represents Wallberg & Co., contractor. Mr. Robertson is a very efficient engineer and thoroughly understands his work. At present he is supervising four different contracts namely: laying down a complete system of waterworks over a mile long which are connected with City waterworks and also supplemented by a large tank in the yard; the building of a tank in the air the bottom of which will be 50 feet from the ground and the total height 85 feet which will hold 80,000 gallons of water weighing 400 tons; the building of a chimney which will be much higher than the tank and the building of a power house 100 feet long by 50 feet wide and 35 feet high. Among the machinery in the power house will be three boilers aggregating 750 horsepower.

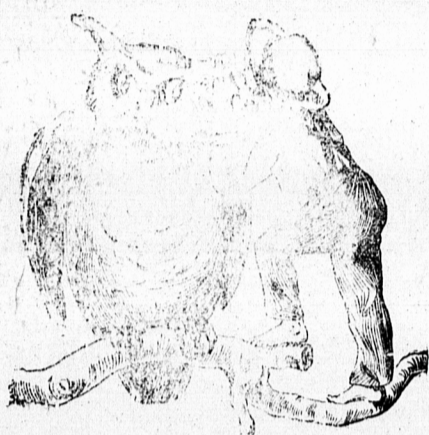

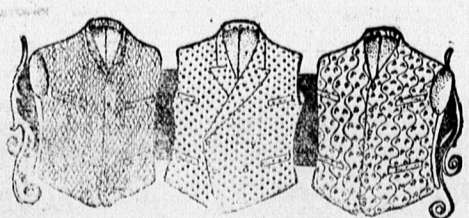
