blast shattered the battleship, sending flame and smoke leaping into the air. Two other explosions then rumbled across the water. For a moment the thousands on shore thought a second naval battle had begun. But as they watched, the Graf Spee settled and sank in 25 feet of water, her superstructure showing above the surface. A little more than half an hour later, as a pillar of fire and jet black smoke plumed upward from the wreckage, a second series of blasts ripped even this away and it sank from view. Shortly before the Graf Spee had sailed to self-destruction, Foreign Minister Alberto Guani of Uruguay, who has borne the brunt of the heavy burden of trying to defend Pan-America's 300-mile neutral belt against further incursions by fighting craft, received a formal call from diplomatic representatives of his sister American nations.

of pupils, however, will be Canadians.

It will require about 40,000 men to establish and maintain the training scheme, exclusive of those in training. Of this staff there will be 2,700 officers, 6,000 civilians and about 30,000 non-commissioned air force personnel.

U. K. To Contribute Aircraft

The United Kingdom will contribute the bulk of aircraft, engines and spares as her share of the cost. Australia and New Zealand will share the cost in proportion to the number of pupils sent to Canada. While the Prime Minister warned that any estimate of the cost would be subject to a change of opinion, he thought the cost for the contract period would be about \$60,000,000 with Canada paying about \$35,000,000.

Estimated expenditure up to next Sept. 1, the Prime Minister said, was \$80,000,000 of which Canada's share would be \$45,000,000. This amount is in addition to the \$315,000,000 which the finance minister estimated would be the cost of the military program already undertaken before the air training plan was proposed. In other words, in this first year of war, Canada will be spending on her military effort alone, about \$1,000,000 a day.

Training for a pilot will take about 26 weeks, an observer 22 weeks and for an air gunner and wireless operator, 20 weeks. There will be an ungraded number of elementary flying schools established, 16 service flying schools and 10 air observer schools, 10 bombing and gunnery schools, two air navigation schools and four wireless training schools.

In addition to the provision for the student training there will be schools for instructors and administrative staffs, ground crews and maintenance men—a total for all purposes of 67.

Use Many Fields

Many of the 42 standard transport Canada airlines fields will be used in the stages of the training scheme and work is going forward on surveys for new fields. Construction will go forward as soon as possible on the schools and other necessary buildings for which plans have been prepared. Some "protective" orders have already been placed for supplies required from outside Canada and, the prime minister said, the war supply board is prepared to place contracts at once for the needed equipment. Without mentioning the Conservative leader by name, the Prime Minister replied in his speech to criticism from Hon. J. A. Manion and others that the dominion had delayed negotiations.

Mr. MacKenzie King said the negotiations had proceeded completely harmoniously with the missions from abroad and that there had been no unnecessary delay.

The air mission under the leadership of Lord Riverdale, a well-known English industrialist, came to Canada with a large staff of experts Oct. 15. On Nov. 15 he was joined by a mission from Australia headed by Hon. J. V. Fairbairn, then minister of civil aviation and now minister for defence.

On Nov. 3 the New Zealand mission arrived headed by group Captain H. W. L. Saunders, chief of the New Zealand staff.

Negotiations on behalf of Canada were carried on by a committee of the cabinet composed of Mr. MacKenzie King, defence minister Rogers, finance minister Raiston, pensions minister MacKenzie (former

IMPROVEMENT IN POULTRY PRICES SEEN

Turnover in Retail Sales in Canada Said "Remarkable"

"The poultry situation is looking better today," a local authority on the industry declared over the week end. "The turnover in the way of retail sales throughout Canada is remarkable. In Montreal, some retail sales are said to be up 50% over last year. In Eastern Canada, at least, it is acknowledged that the peak of chicken marketing is past and the indications are that the price of chicken will be higher. It appears that a high percentage of the increased chicken crop that may have existed has now been absorbed."

The first sales of western turkeys in Montreal sold at 21 1/2c for Grade A box packed. Cost of grading and boxing would be approximately 2c a pound. The tendency for the part of large operators is to hold out for at least 22c box packed. Live turkeys are being shipped to the United States market, helping to deplete the surplus for this quality of poultry.

The newspaper, radio and streamer advertisement programme is under way, and it is apparently giving good results in increasing the consumption of the product. There appears to be a fairly good demand for chickens in Prince Edward Island, which shows a wide range of prices for Grade A market birds. The way from 16c to 19c a pound.

The egg market in principal Eastern Centers developed a slightly firmer trend during the week and it would now appear to be on a level more in keeping with normal prices at this season. With the milder weather in Western Canada, egg receipts are increasing and it may not be long before these provinces will be looking for an outside market.

Egg receipts continue low in Prince Edward Island and most of the supplies are being used locally. Many country shippers and larger dealers are shipping direct to Halifax and St. John markets due to better markets.

The local demand for eggs is good, with Charlottetown dealers quoting at country points Grade A Large 28-30; Grade A Medium, 26-28; Grade B 22-24; and Grade C 16-18.

The Halifax egg market reports supplies of fresh eggs light and bulk of trade requirements coming from the United States. Dealers are paying producers for ungraded eggs: Grade A Large 33c; Grade A Medium 28c; Grade B 24c and Grade C 16c.
