## THE BOER DELEGATES.

Three delegates from the Dutch Republics, after visiting different capitals in Europe, with little success so far as the object of their mission was concerned, are now in the United States, and are said to be meeting with a very warm reception from the Anti-British section of the great American Republic. They were presented with the freedom of New York city, and have had the pleasure of listening to resolutions and speeches in various cities expressing "American" sympathy for them and their cause. The delegates have fully proclaimed their mission to the public before proceeding to Washington, and this fact sufficiently shows that they have no hope of diplomatic intervention by the United States Government in their behalf.

President McKinley and his Cabinet have no more right to intervene in this quarrel than Britain has to call for a halt in United States operations against the Filipinos. To attempt to intervene would be to meet with a quick rebuff. Attempted intervention could only be interpreted as an unfriendly act, a meddling impertinence, compromising the dignity of the American Republic, without the possibility of accomplishing anything to the advantage of the Boers.

It has been stated in the press that the Boer delegates are empowered to offer to the United States a protectorate over the two Dutch Republics as a means toward their retaining their national independence. This is almost too childish for belief. But if true, a moment's reflection will show how futile such an attempt would be. If the Government of the United States accepted the offered protectorate they would be obligated to proceed at once to make war with Britain and wrest the already conquered territories from her hands. This would mean the sending of an armed force to South Africa stronger than the British and colonial forces already there, and overcoming the British fleet on the way. It is quite clear that the expedition would never be permitted to leave United States ports, or if perchance it stole away secretly it would be destroyed before it could reach the mid-Atlantic.

It is, as we have said, utterly childish to suppose that the United States Government either desires a protectorate in South Africa, or if it did desire it would under existing conditions undertake a gigantic war to give it effect. The Boer delegates must therefore content themselves with the speeches and resolutions of sympathy so lavishly offered them. They will not stop Lord Robert's onward march, much less save the Dutch Republics from being hereafter British territory.

It was Philip Botha, and not the Commander in Chief of the Boer forces, who was captured by General Hutton.

Governor Roosevelt, of New York, recently reinstated a policeman who had been discharged 17 years ago on false charges of drunkenness, and awarded him back-pay for the 17 years, \$23,406.40.

The Free State Government have again removed their capital, this time to the little village of Vreda, away off in the northeastern part of the state. It has only 200 inhabitants. A much smaller place than that will do for Steyn's capital a few months from now.

The terms of surrender are becoming stiffer as the wargoes on. Our despatches note that Dewit's command at Lindley offered to surrender on condition of being allowed to return to their farms, but the condition was not accepted by Gen. Hamilton.

It is reported that the Governor-Generalship of Australia will be offered to the Duke of Argyll, formerly the Marquis of Lorne, but that he is not likely to accept the position as the Princess Louise is not

attracted by the prospect of residing so far south.

The Patriot's Prince County correspondent apparently thinks the third commandment of the Decalogue in some way deals with the observance of the Sabbath. Ottawa has received in relief subscriptions more than twice the sum sent in to St. John after the great fire in that city in 1877, and a portion of the St. John Relief Fund is still being paid out in annuities, 27 years after the fire. The abundant money sent to Ottawa gave the Toronto World occasion to say that the city of Ottawa would not issue the \$100,000 of debentures authorized there for the sufferers. The Ottawa Citizen contradicts this flatly, but publishes a statement from the Relief Committee that they are not asking for any further assistance.

A cable correspondent tells an amusing story of General Buller and his supplies which runs in this fashion:
