IN MEMORIAM.—Miss Nettie Johnstone, of Long River, died on Saturday, the 8th inst. The funeral which was largely attended, there being about 150 sleighs, took place on Monday. At the request of her pastor, Rev. Charles McKay, the service was conducted by Rev. A. Sterling, who preached an able and impressive discourse from Rev. 7, 14-17. There are few in this part of the country better known or more loved than Miss Johnstone. Her life was a grand poem full of pathos, sweetness and simplicity. Love truly took up the harp of her life, for she delighted in the luxury of helping others. Tender in heart, and firm in will; faithful to friends and gentle to all, she exhibited a high type of consecrated life. Sweet in disposition, cultured in mind refined in manner and susceptible to the purest emotions, she was an ideal woman. All who came in close touch with her felt the elevating influence of a noble life. However tender and charitable to the erring she never winked at their sin, and her eye could flash with righteous indignation at any injustice to others. To say that she had no enemy would be a doubtful compliment, but it may be safely said that she never gave any just cause for enmity. Amid the lights and shadows of a sinful world few have borne the white flower of a blameless life as Miss Nettie Johnstone has done. Such a life, however short, is full of the mellow music that is set to the love Divine, and must be a benediction to the world. Miss Johnstone was the most faithful and loyal helper in the church of which she was a consistent member. She was Secretary of the Ladies' Missionary Society, a Sabbath school teacher, Superintendent of the Mission Band and a member of the Christian Endeavor, as well as an efficient worker in every good cause. The children loved her, and only eternity can reveal her loving influence over them. But her character was greater than any of her works, and if all who profess Christ, lived as she did, there would be less room for the sinners of the world, and more souls won for the Master. Those who knew her bright and beautiful life have good reason to hope that she is now in the land of eternal love, where no shadows ever fall and where sorrow is unknown.
