—SCHOONER ARRIVES.—The schooner J. B. Martin arrived in Summerside with coal from Pictou yesterday morning.

—MAY QUEEN SAILS.—The Tug May Queen, belonging to Fred McGee, Port Elgin, with a load of lobster cases for distribution among the different factories controlled by him, arrived in Summerside Tuesday night and left yesterday on return.

—AUTOMOBILE ACT.—At a largely attended public meeting of the residents of Middleton School District held on Monday evening, April 21st, the repeal of the Automobile Act was strongly denounced by nearly all of those present. A vote being taken it stood 28 against and 6 in favor of allowing the autos to run on P. E. A petition is being signed and sent to the representatives of this district, and to the Premier protesting strongly against the passing of the bill. Colin C. —A RESOLUTION.—At a meeting of the residents of Sherbrook held in the school house on Monday evening April 21st, the following resolutions were unanimously adopted. Resolved that the ratepayers of Sherbrook School District No. 69 do strongly protest against the repeal of the Auto Act of 1907 and as said school district is part in the fourth electoral and part in fifty electoral district, further resolved that a copy be sent to Premier Matheson, Mr. John Richards, and to the Representatives of the above electoral districts also to the press. —PROHIBITION RAIDS.— Acting under instructions from Inspector Phillips, Constables Tanton and Squarebriggs, C. Barbour and E. Barbour, with five different search warrants made a raid on the premises of John C. Lewis, Andrew Graves, Mrs. Andrew Graves, P. B. Lewis and W. Wells of Alberton. At the first four named places a large quantity of either beer or liquor was secured, the result of the search weighing in the vicinity of 2500 lbs, which the constables brought with them to Summerside. At the last named place some beer was found, but samples only of it was taken which will be analyzed. Inspector Phillips has been troubled lately by numerous complaints of liquor being sold in Alberton and the results were as given above. There will be a determined effort on his part to weed out this business in Alberton. Some of the new raids are not new in this business, one of them having only recently paid \$200 for a second offence.

—PROHIBITION.— Three prohibition cases, on prosecution of Inspector Phillips, were tried before Stipendiary Wright at Kensington yesterday, two of which were dismissed and the other adjourned for a week.

—FOX MEETING.—At a meeting of the fox owners of Central Bedeque and vicinity, representing eight different fox companies, held last evening, the following resolution was passed: Resolved, that this meeting strongly disapproves of the proposed tax on the fox industry, especially on ranches where foreign capital is invested. This tax will tend to drive the industry to other Provinces where no tax exists.—J.

—AUTOMOBILES.—At a meeting of the electors of the Central Bedeque School District, held on Monday evening last, the following resolution was passed by a good majority: Whereas, the use of automobiles on our country roads would be a source of great inconvenience and danger; Therefore resolved, that we, the residents of Central Bedeque, express in the strongest manner our disapproval of the present effort to repeal the Automobile Act of 1907. —LECTURE.—Mr. J. E. B. McCready, Publicity Agent, delivered a very interesting address, under the auspices of the Board of Trade, on "Our Position and Prospects" before a fairly large audience in St. Paul's Hall, Summerside, last evening. Mr. Neil McLeod, K. C., acted as chairman. In his address the lecturer spoke of the existing conditions in the Province at the present time and the prospects of the future, which will originate with the Car Ferry and other improvements in transportation. At the close of the lecture a hearty vote of thanks, moved by Mr. Chas. Hensley, seconded by Rev. Dr. Gauthier and supported by Capt. Read, Mr. Donald Matheson and others, was tendered to the lecturer.—J.

FRENCH MAYOR SENTENCED TO FIFTEEN Y. ARS

PARIS, April 22.—Eugene Prosper Piron, mayor of the city of Gentilly to the south of Paris, was sentenced today to fifteen years imprisonment on a charge of attempting to murder two elderly women by stabbing them on December 28 last at Perrux, near Paris. Piron was a prominent merchant, and it was alleged that the motive for the crime was robbery, as he had recently lost heavily in speculation.

A SUICIDE WAVE FOLLOWS ON FLOOD.

CINCINNATI, April 22.—A gloomy weather and mental depression following the excitement caused by reading of flood disasters were assigned by Coroner Foertmeyer as probable factors in a "suicide wave" that led to three deaths and two attempts at self-destruction in three days. The third death reported to the coroner was that of Mrs. Mary McCabe, aged fifty-one. While the coroner was investigating her death he had still to complete his inquiries into the suicide of Harry Boekhoefer, aged twenty-seven, a clerk, and Mrs. Katherine Stamm, aged fifty-nine.

James Curtis, fifty-five a preacher who drank acid and then threatened to cut his throat at his home, was out of danger today. James McManus, aged nineteen was in a serious condition at the Cincinnati Hospital as a result of drinking acid.
