Miss Alice M. Harrison will resume her piano classes on October 12th. While in England Miss Harrison has studied with a prominent London master connected with the Royal College of Music.

The schooners J. R. Ernst, Daley from Charlottetown to North Sydney; Boreas, Colford, Robertsor Quarry to Charlottetown, and Pacific, Murray, North Sydney to Summerside, passed through St. Peter's Canal on Thursday.

Nine young men, all of a size, and eighteen to twenty years of age were initiated Thursday evening into the slow Court, Canadian Order of Foresters, by Organizer S. F. Tarbut and he has another lot for initiation at another special meeting called for 23rd inst. He has initiated eighty eight (88) new candidates in a short time in two Courts, Court Dalrymple and Hunter River and Court Hatt. Stewart in Kensington, with several candidates ahead for other Courts in Queen's County.

Hon. R. L. Borden has not yet forgotten his recent promise while in this province regarding Prince Edward Island transportation difficulties. The following is a telegram sent by him to the Conservator N. B. from Picton, Medley G. Sid dall Esq., Sackville: "Am convinced that interests of Intercolonial Railway demand acquisition of branch line railways as feeders, and we propose to acquire them upon reasonable terms if returned to power. We also intend to improve service between Prince Edward Island and the mainland." (Signed) R. L. BORDEN.

That reciprocity will be a great benefit to Canada in the firm conviction of John C. Clark, of Ba. View, Prince Edward Island, who, with Mrs. Clark and daughter, is visiting his son, Dr. J. F. Clark, city. Mr. Clark left his Island home on July 12, since when he has been in every province of Canada, except Nova Scotia, and spent a month in Manitoba, camping on the banks of the Red River, and visiting another son, Dr. F. S. Clark, on the Indian reserves of which he has charge north of the Fairford river, at the northern end of Lake Manitoba. During his journey across the continent Mr. Clark had many opportunities of meeting with prominent men of all shades of political opinion and of diverse interests and he found that the consensus of opinion is favorable to the trade agreement. In his early days Mr. Clark, while engaged in shipbuilding and commercial business with his uncle at New Glasgow, P. E. I., was able to study closely the effects of the reciprocity agreement which existed between the United States and Canada from 1854 to 1866. During the continuance of the treaty the Island province progressed by leaps and bounds. Its abrogation by the Americans had for a time a very detrimental effect on the trade of the Maritime Provinces. From his knowledge of the workings of the former treaty and after a careful consideration of the proposed reciprocity agreement, Mr. Clark has no doubt that the Dominion government is securing the best terms that can be obtained. Since his visit west, some eleven years ago, Mr. Clark says that Calgary, Winnipeg and Vancouver have so far exceeded his expectations that he scarcely recognized them. Having surveyed the political situation from east to west, Mr. Clark is of the opinion that the Laurier government will be returned to power on September 21. All talk of annexation, he says, is regarded as a mere bogey down east.—Vancouver Exc.

Miss Cora Dean, Providence, R. I., who has been visiting in Dunedin the guest of A. C. & Mrs. McLean, was a passenger to this city by the S. S. Harland Saturday Morning.

The following additional particulars have been received of the marriage of James Walter Young to Miss Elizabeth Moore, City, which took place Sept. 22nd. The bride was becomingly attired in cream cashmere with lace trimmings and wore a large picture hat of black satin with large ostrich plume and pink and green satin roses. Her travelling suit was olive green encaustic cloth with braid trimmings. The bride was attended by her sister Miss Jessie L. Moore of New Glasgow Nova Scotia, who wore a cream dress with pink trimmings and hat to match. The groom was ably supported by Joseph Gaudet of this city. The bride and groom were recipients of many handsome and useful presents including handsome china tea set from A. F. and Mrs. Webster, vicker rocker from the employees of the Star Laundry, Morris chair from the young men of the Morell House also a handsome sugar spoon and butter knife from Mr. and Mrs. Sellner. The gift of the groomsmen was in elegant silver biscuit jar. The bride's maid present was a silver ickle dish, also many other valuable presents which testified to the esteem in which the young couple were held by their many friends in this city.

The thrilling experience of the members of the schooner Raeburn, which created no little anxiety by being a flag of distress off Cape Traverse on Wednesday last, has been told by the captain, John M. Chapman, Murray Harbor, and that it as thrilling there can be no doubt. The young wife, his sister-in-law, owns the Raeburn, a twin schooner of 84 tons, launched 18 months ago at Rexton, N. B., left port on Tuesday morning at three o'clock with 163 tons coal for the E. I. R. at Summerside. With him was his young wife, his sister-in-law, John Graham, the mate, and Alfred Chapman, his brother, as cook, all of Murray Harbor. They encountered strong winds from the south all day and at three o'clock that afternoon when off Cape Traverse they met a terrific thunder squall. In a short space of time practically all the canvas was stripped off and the vessel, running under bare poles was fast driving towards the shoals. Two anchors were dropped and for some time these dragged but finally became fast and held the Raeburn until the wind eased off. All Wednesday night the crew experienced mortal anxiety and their position was the more keenly felt by reason of the presence of the women. To add to their hardship their supply of water was spoiled and they had nothing but salt water to drink. On Thursday morning the wind had eased off and temporary repairs were made to the foresail and one jib. With these she ran before the wind to St. Peter's Island where she was met by the Brant and towed into her port. Their escape the captain considers a marvellous one and he does not mourn over the loss of a set of sails which it will take \$400 to replace when he thinks of his good fortune in saving the vessel and cargo. The Raeburn was uninsured. Of the cargo he lost the deckload. The Raeburn, after being refitted with sails by B. Stewart & Co., Ltd., will proceed to Pictou for a cargo of lumber for Canso.
