## THE KING CANNOT COME.

It was no doubt a matter of regret to many of our readers yesterday when they learned definitely that King Edward feels compelled to decline the invitation of the Canadian people to visit the Dominion. There are millions of his people in America who would welcome the King most heartily and joyfully if he could come. Perhaps there is no country in the world at the present time where the attachment of the great mass of people for their ruler is so strong and so general as in the case in the British dominions. And the cases have been few in the history of nations where the happy combination exists of a ruler so able, so wise, so tactful, so devoted to peace and good will among men, enjoying so large a share of the mingled respect and affection of his subjects.

King Edward when he was Prince of Wales visited British America forty-six years ago. He was met with joyful and loyal acclamation everywhere he went, and during all those years those who saw him then and who are still in the land of the living cherish the memory of that visit as an event in their lives. Prince Edward was then looked upon as our future ruler with pride and hope, and it may be affirmed without reserve that the fondest hopes and prayers that went out for him in those distant days have been abundantly realized in King Edward VII. He saw Canada in embryo. Our people ardently desired that he should see the full-grown, rich and powerful Dominion as it is today. It would be grateful to our loyal feelings and a source of pride alike to King and people if he could come.

That pleasure is to be denied alike to him and to us. We believe that King Edward would gladly accept our invitation if circumstances would permit. The reasons given for his declination must be held to be sufficient. "The cares that yoke with empire" are heavy. His Majesty is no longer young, and his dominions are worldwide. He could not come to Canada without visiting every Province and all the principal cities from the Atlantic to the Pacific. Should he visit the Dominion there would be an urgent demand that he would also visit Washington, which for reasons of state it might not be thought proper to decline. India, Australia and South Africa would clamor for a like honor, and it would be hard to refuse after a visit to Canada. In a word the King cannot come to see us because the Empire is too vast to be visited in detail and he is too wise to make what might seem to be an invidious distinction by paying a visit to Canada alone. Our regret is great that he cannot come. Our surprise is not so great, and we are compelled to admit that the reasons given for his declination appear to be sufficient.

Premier Gouin on his return to Montreal told an interviewer that he found Premier Peters in entire accord with him in regard to increased provincial subsidies and he is very hopeful that the movement will succeed at an early day.

## PICTOU CATTLE DISEASE.

There has been published by the Ottawa Department of Agriculture a special report on the Pictou cattle disease embodying the painstaking research and effort of Dr. W. H. Patrick in regard thereto. The important facts demonstrated by this report are that the Pictou cattle disease is not in any way infectious or transmissible from one animal to another and that the disease is directly produced by the cattle eating the weed commonly known as ragwort.

This weed is not native to Nova Scotia or to Canada. It appears to have been brought to Pictou some thirty-five or forty years ago in ballast, and thence has gradually spread, mostly in an easterly direction, until it now covers a strip of coast some 60 miles in length from a point ten miles west of Pictou to the strait of Canso and from two to twenty miles broad. Previous to 1881 there had died of cattle in this area 1,300 head, and Dr. Patrick estimates the annual loss since 1881 at 200 head, making a grand total of 6,300 head.

Very regrettably the detestable ragwort has obtained a foothold at several points in our own Province and is spreading from these centres, near Alberton, Souris and elsewhere. It is all important that the weed shall be extirpated promptly. In pasture lands sheep are known to hold it in check, and do not die from eating it as cattle do, but it cannot be healthful food for them. The work of destroying the weed requires the united effort of many hands even now, and will grow increasingly hard as the weed spreads to wider areas from year to year.

July is usually our hottest month in Canada, with August its closest second. June and September are about of equal average temperature inland, but in Prince Edward Island September is usually much warmer than June. We very seldom have warmer weather in Charlottetown than within the past few days.

## THE RUSSIAN PUZZLE.

The greater part of Russia is an unknown land to the people of other countries. The like remark will apply to its government and people and the conditions existing. The living people of the British Isles or America have had no experience of despotic rule. Hence it is that what is going on in Russia at the present time is a puzzle to most readers and any attempt to settle what the outcome will be, or when the new order of things will be established is looked upon as mere conjecture.

M Leroy Beaulieu, Director of Institute of France, who is reported to be the one man outside of Russia who best understands the situation in the Northern Empire, is also puzzled. He sees, however, that Russia is undergoing a vast and complete transition, resembling that of the French revolution. He anticipates that the transition period may cover from ten to twenty years; that the monarchy may be overthrown, but this is by no means certain and would be a calamity; that in any case the despotic power of the Czar is doomed, and that the best outcome would be for him to accept at once the formation of a ministry which would have the confidence and support of the National Parliament.

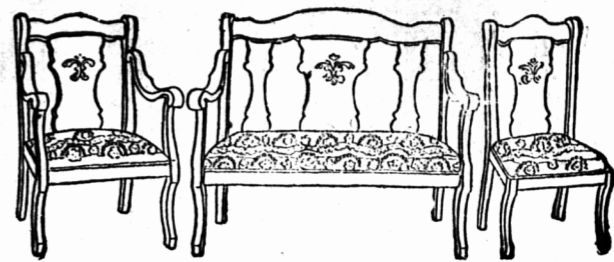
