—PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH MEETING—The annual meeting of the Kingsville Presbyterian Congregation was held in the Church on the evening of January 29th. Rev. J. W. McLeod presiding. The meeting was largely attended, and a lively interest was shown in reviewing the work of the past year. The treasurer's report showed the receipt for the year by envelope for congregational expenses to be \$1429.25. For Missions, \$1209.08. Plate collections, \$412.53. For Missions by the W. M. S. \$379.91. By the Young People's Missionary Society, \$273.00. By the Mission Band, \$85.00. By the Sunday School, \$71.95. Session fund, \$27.00. Contributions for Manse Fund, \$263.20. Collected for Bible Society \$50.00. Receipts Ladies Aid Society, \$65.00. Sunday contributions for benevolent objects, \$60.00. Total contributed for all purposes, approximately \$4295.00. At the close of the business meeting, all were invited to the school room, where the ladies served refreshments and a very pleasant social hour was spent. Although somewhat reduced in number on account of the disruption following the vote on Union, the congregation has decided to carry on its work as usual. A special appeal has been made to the people for support in view of the changed conditions, and as a result we have a new subscription list amounting to \$1600.00 for congregational expenses and \$900.00 for Missions. A total of \$2500.00, \$129.00 less than the receipts from last year's list. Thus it will be seen that we are well equipped financially for the work of another year, and trust that we may have the guidance and blessing of the great Head of the Church who alone can crown our efforts with true success.—Com.
