Colombia - Peru Dispute Causing Grave Concern

South American Republics Reported Preparing For War Over Small Border Port On Amazon River.

(By Guardian's Special Wire) GENEVA, April 12.—The League of Nations advisory committee was informed today that Colombia and Peru are preparing for war over the Leticia border area, but that body sided with the latter in the hope the two countries might conciliate their dispute.

INCONSISTENCY OF LIBERAL PARTY BARED

Premier Bennett Challenges Liberal Party Re Definite Practical Policy.

By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, April 12.—A challenge to the members of the Liberal party to say they are offering "a definite, practical policy," or that they are squarely facing the issues of government which confront the Dominion, was voiced by Prime Minister R. B. Bennett in an address tonight to the electors of South Oxford.

The address was in support of Hon. Donald Sutherland who is contesting the seat for the Conservative party in the Federal by-election which will be decided at the polls on Monday next. The Premier also attacked the death of Thomas Cayley who held the seat for the Liberal party.

SAMPSON SENTENCED TO HANG JUNE 26

Halifax Negro Condemned to Death For Murder of Young Boys.

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, April 12.—The death penalty had been decreed tonight for Daniel P. Sampson, convicted murderer of one boy and self-admitted slayer of another.

The negro slayer was to hang June 26 under sentence imposed today by Mr. Justice John Doull at the conclusion of his trial on the charge of murdering 12-year-old Bramwell Hefernan.

He was not to be tried immediately on the indictment charging him with killing Bramwell's 10-year-old brother Eddie at the same time. The second case was to be tried today at the next Supreme Court term. By that time the date set for the execution will have passed.

CAPT. MASON GIVEN THREE YEAR TERM

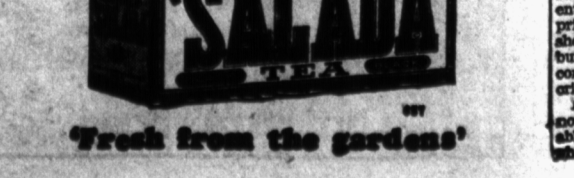
FIRE SWEEPS RESERVATION

Prime Minister Scores Obstructionist Tactics Of Liberal Opposition

Followers Of Mackenzie King, Who Is Absent On Political Campaign In South Oxford, Denounced For Efforts To Blockade Unemployment Relief Bill In House Of Commons.

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, April 12.—In the bitterest afternoon of debate this session, Premier R. B. Bennett charged in the House of Commons today the Liberals were attempting blockade tactics against the Government Relief Bill. Climaxing a tempestuous debate, he moved the bill out of committee with the observation that progress seemed impossible.

While Liberals shouted denials and hurled points of order and demands to withdraw, the Prime Minister exclaimed, "It is quite obvious the purpose of the Opposition is not to proceed with this measure in absence of the Liberal leader" (Mr. Hon. Mackenzie King is taking part in the South Oxford bye-election campaign).

Gives Evidence Before Bank Committee

Wilson, general manager of the Royal Bank of Canada, the House committee on banking and commerce concluded today that phase of the inquiry initiated by a motion of Major C. G. Speculation RE DISCOVERY OF WRECKAGE

E., today aroused speculation here as to whether it came from the little auxiliary schooner Ospee, unreported since sailing out of Lunenburg almost three months ago with a crew of fresh-water sailors aboard.

FIRE DESTROYS QUE. CONVENT

Q., April 12.—(Canadian Press)—Fires were held for the safety of Sister St. Charles early today following the destruction by fire of the convent of Sisters of St. Joseph de St. Valere at St. Gregoire de Montmorency. In addition to the three-story convent the residence of the nuns nearby was destroyed and a hasty checkup failed to account for Sister St. Charles.
