mentioned a current critical expression "There is something wrong with the Church." The greatest need of the Church is not more members, desirable as this factor may be. The urgent need is for a higher quality of life, a deeper spirit of consecration, a loyal passionate devotion of Jesus and his principles.

"Deny himself" said Jesus. Self denial is basic to all progress. There are two ways to organize living, round self and its interests, or toward God and humanity. To this higher choice the Church has not yet fully arrived. Are we able?

"Take up his cross." The cross as Jesus spoke was not something that one passively received but that he actively accepted. "No man takes my life" said Jesus. "I lay it down for myself." The cross is the price of the stand we take, the cross is the price of principles loyally adhered to. Again, "are we able?"

"Follow me." It is not enough to take the cross and stand still. Follow, yes, even to Jerusalem and Calvary. We speak of it lightly. It is a tremendous thing to let him deny himself, take up his cross and follow me, the speaker disciples, follow me. "Are we able?" The anthem of the morning was Mauder's "Praise the Lord, O Jerusalem." The solo was taken by Miss Vera Campbell. "Thanksgiving at Midnight" was the theme of an eloquent sermon by the Rev. H. L.
