In answer to an inquiry the GUARDIAN publishes the following taken from an exchange: The term "Boxers" according to Professor Williams, the distinguished orientalist of Yale University, is derived from a Chinese word about equivalent to the English term for rough classes, and indicates pretty clearly the character of those engaged in the outbreak. The Chinese term is "Yi Ho Chaun," which may be interpreted as Righteousness, Harmony and Fists." To describe the "Boxer" rising in China as a rebellion is to miss its true nature. It is rather an "ante-foreign" movement with which the Chinese government—the dowager empress—is known to be in hearty sympathy if not in actual co-operation. The movement is described as co-extensive with "the whole country," and is certainly participated in by the village population as well as the soldiery.

THE semi-annual examination of the Bradalbane village school was held on Friday the 15th ult., in the presence of a goodly number of the ratepayers and visitors. The examination was conducted by Mr. W. D. McKinnon, teacher of the adjacent Bradalbane school and Miss Mabel McLeod a recent graduate of the school assisted by the teacher Mr. J. E. Gillis. Upwards of thirty pupils were present, who were carefully tested in their previous work, and judging from their promptness and accurateness in answering to the searching questions put them ample evidence of the most careful teaching was manifest, reflecting due credit upon themselves and their teacher. At the close of the proceedings complimentary remarks were made by those present on behalf of the marked progress the school has made since securing the present teacher's services.

SCHOOL EXAMINATION.—The semi-annual examination of Wellington Station school was held on the 16th inst. in the presence of a large number of visitors. The examination was conducted by Messrs. G. W. Elaxander, Principal of Washington school, J. Roland Cahill, Principal of Cross Rivers school, J. T. Arsenault M. L. A., Joseph Arsenault, Station Agent, Philip Arsenault, A. Ready, and the teacher, Miss Gertrude McNeill. The questions addressed to the pupils were searching and comprehensive and the answers were most satisfactory. The coolness and confidence of the pupils and the knowledge they displayed of all the branches they were studying, were unmistakable evidence of the thoroughness of the teacher's work and of the pupils' mastery of the matter studied. At the close, remarks were made by the examiners and others present, complimenting the pupils on their high standing and the teacher on her success in the profession. There is a school difficulty of management since half the number of pupils are English speaking, half French; hence almost double work. But Miss McNeill has displayed the ability required to direct the studies of such a school and knows how to impart knowledge so that it may be turned to actual use in practical life.

Strong as we are the ties which bind "John" to the scene of his devoted labors, we are glad to observe that he is never derelict, in his duty to his home, which he manages to visit quite frequently. In this connection it is worthy of remark, as evidencing how strongly the love of home ties is developed in our esteemed pedagogue, that even in the matter of nomenclature, he shows a marked predilection for his native city.—Mr. Samuel Clow, one of our most esteemed residents, has recently purchased the homestead of his ancestors upon which, on dit, he intends shortly to settle.—Miss Charlotte Matthew, one of our popular young ladies, and her brother Wesley, are visiting friends in Pownal.
