PRODUCE

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Nov 8—Quotations held firm on the Montreal produce and grain market today. Graded shipments of eggs in less than carlots were quoted at 45 to 46 cents a dozen for A large, 42 cents for A medium, 35 cents for A pullets, 21 to 23 cents for B and 19 to 19 1/2 cents for C. Receipts were 203 cases. Fresh no 1 butter was up slightly at 19 1/2 to 20 cents a pound for carlots or less. Arrivals totalled 578 boxes. To retailers solids were 20 1/2 to 21 cents and points 21 1/2 to 22 cents a pound. Cheese was unchanged at 10 1/2 cents a pound for No 1 Ontario and 9 1/2 cents for No 1 Quebec. Receipts by rail amounted to 1,000 boxes. Potatoes held steady at 35 to 40 cents for Quebec, 40 to 45 cents for New Brunswick, and 45 to 50 cents for Prince Edward Island, all per 30 pound bag.

GRAIN

(Canadian Press) WINNIPEG, Nov 8—Bearishness of Chicago market has offset bullishness at Liverpool in deciding the price trend on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange today. Wheat futures prices skidded sharply in the late dealings to close 1 to 1 1/2 cents lower, December at 78 1/2, May 83 1/2, and July 84 1/2 cents, the day's lowest levels. Coupled with a 1 1/2 cent decline in the southern market was the continuing absence of a broad demand for Canadian wheat. Export sales today totalled only 300,000 bushels. Estimates of larger wheat shipments from the Argentine this week probably about 4,000,000 bushels, failed to stir the Liverpool market. Prices there closed about 1 1/2 higher. Argentine wheat shipments last week totalled only 1,362,000 bushels and 1,500,000 the week previous. Other reports said Argentine wheat was moving toward gulf ports unacceptably for Mexican consumption. Half-cent advances were scored in spreads on high-grade wheats in the cash-grain market, with demand continuing good. Coarse grains futures prices were influenced by wheat, closing fractionally lower.

MINING

(Canadian Press) TORONTO, Nov 8—A half dozen secondary gold shares and some of the penny stocks occupied the spotlight today on the mining department of the Toronto Exchange, while traders rallied on with intermittent spurts for about a week, showing signs of flagging though the operations may have been due to the unsettled note in the New York market. Volume was close to 700,000 shares but the expansion was due mainly to operations in the cheap issues. Hollinger was slightly erratic, moving up to 2 1/2 in the morning on heavy buying and closing at 20 20 for a net loss of 40 cents. Dome, Wright, Graves and McIntyre dropped 10 to 20 on smaller trade and Teck Hughes on fair turnover received 5 cents to 4 1/2. Bralorne and Fionner held to the upside by 10 cents each. N.Y. Market Eases Off After Four Day Advance

(By Frederick Gardner, Associated Press Financial Writer) NEW YORK, Nov 8—Post-election demand for stocks slackened today and the market sold off a trifle after a four-day advance. Although many brokers and security analysts expressed a belief in inflationary tendencies, traders were in no rush to expand their holdings of shares and commodities. The upturn in the preceding session tempted profit-taking. As stocks eased after the opening, trading quieted and the turnover dwindled to 943,310 shares compared with 1,111,090 yesterday. Commodities retreated with stocks, causing traders to mix a liberal amount of skepticism with the inflationary sentiment engendered by prophecies the Democratic election sweep meant more heavy government spending. Wheat dropped back 1-8 to 1-3 3/4 cents a bushel. Laces in rye ranged up 2 3/4 cents. Cotton dipped 30 to 40 cents a bale, the market paying little attention to the latest crop report. Foreign exchange diverted attention from security markets in view of the French political crisis. The franc, however, firmed, indicating the market had anticipated developments, although it remained at levels permitting gold exports from Paris. The inflationary pattern of the previous day's movements in financial markets was reversed as U. S. government bonds stiffened.

(Canadian Press) Close year since spring. The "Iron Age" said the way had been cleared for further improvement in iron and steel demand and forecast a "steady and perhaps accelerating upward trend" in the industry the rest of the year. It estimated current output at 26 1-2 percent of capacity, a gain of 1-2 of one percentage point. A further decline of \$38,000,000 in loans to brokers by New York City banks for their own account made the total \$576,000,000. Total security loans of New York City banks were \$1,381,000,000, a net drop of \$38,000,000 for the week. Despite a further gain of \$49,000,000 in money in circulation, as revealed in the weekly federal reserve statements, member bank reserves increased \$26,000,000 to \$4,032,000,000. Monetary gold stock increased \$6,000,000.
