This, I am confident, is the purpose of this and other remembrance services today.

These men and women have left us many things for which we must now strive. They fought for our freedom, let us use it, let us keep it. They left many comrades who are in our hearts, and who just as willingly gave of themselves and would just as willingly have died. Let us not forget the living in our eagerness to remember the dead.

We realize that the soldiers, airmen, sailors, and members of the women's forces of whom we think today embraced every form of religion, every manner of creed, every colour, every race, and every political group, every means of livelihood, and every type of personal characteristic known to our great Dominion. We cannot help but realize the value they placed on this freedom enjoyed in our country in dying for it.

The present threat of cessation of peace should make us realize that human sacrifice is insufficient to purchase and preserve freedom and peace. We must by now realize the need for placing confidence in something greater than human governments and national armies. It is altogether obvious from history that human efforts shall not succeed to this end, and that we must turn to Divine Wisdom and guidance to gain it.

If we will turn to God; study and follow His word; believe and follow His son, and teach all men so to do, — then lasting true peace and freedom shall belong to man throughout the world.

In remembrance of those who have died, especially those whom you know so well, and loved so dearly, we are gathered here today. We cannot forget their efforts and the cost of those efforts. We cannot neglect the rightful tribute that is theirs. In remembering, let us pray that God will remember and consider well their ways, and honour them according to his own will. — Lan.
