## Sees British Spirit Sturdy And Unconquered

### Chief Justice Mathieson, Honoured By Law Society Last Evening, Gives Inspiring Review Of Recent Visit To England And Scotland. His Lordship Is Recipient Of Cordial Address On Behalf Of Society.

Chief Justice, who was guest of honor at a largely attended dinner of the Law Society last evening.

The indomitable spirit of the British people—the spirit that carried them successfully through the Great War—a spirit marked by confidence, by the utter absence of despair, is manifest today in a striking degree, reported the Hon. J. A. Mathieson, K. C., Chief Justice of the Province, in the course of an intensely interesting address last night on the subject of his recent holiday visit to England and Scotland, which he made accompanied by Mrs. Mathieson. The Chief Justice spoke at a dinner tendered him in the Canadian National Hotel by the Law Society of Prince Edward Island. Details of his visit to the British law-courts, and houses of Parliament and Privy Council as well as to many historical spots in London, Edinburgh and other centres were followed with the keenest appreciation by his hearers, who included members of the Bench, the clergy and medical profession as well as of the Bar.

## Germany Takes Drastic Measures To Curb Violence

### Political Outbursts Have Resulted In The Killing Of 140 Persons Since June 1st. — Death Penalty For Acts Of Terrorism.

BERLIN, Aug. 9.—(A.P.)—The Government tonight invoked extraordinary powers, including the death penalty, in an effort to put a stop to outbursts of political violence which have resulted in the killing of at least 140 persons and serious injuries to more than 1,000 since June 1.

With the approval of President Paul Von Hindenburg, three emergency decrees were issued by Chancellor Von Papen.

One of these extended the political truce to Sept. 1. Another set up heavy penalties, including sentence of death, for acts of terrorism. The third instituted special "speed" courts to deal summarily with offenders.

## Canada's Trade Offer Is Still Being Considered

### Indications Are That The Dominion Reply Will, In The Main, Stand By The Offer Of Preference For Preference Which This Country Has Already Made To Great Britain.

OTTAWA, Aug. 9.—Canada's reply to Great Britain is understood to be virtually ready. Its delivery is expected tomorrow. Indications tonight are that the reply will, in the main, stand by the offer of preference for preference which Canada has already made to Great Britain. On iron and steel, some concessions may be made to the British viewpoint but the Canadian view, generally speaking, is that the offer is fair.

One Canadian Minister, discussing the situation tonight, was inclined to brush aside the difference of opinion between British and Canadian experts as to the value of Canada's offer in terms of British export trade.

## Expect Success In Negotiations
