LONDON, June 14 (AP) — Prime Minister Churchill, hailing "marked improvement" in relations with Russia and continuing "complete accord" with the United States, took steps today to place Britain's foreign policy on a solid non-partisan basis for the Big Three meeting expected in July.

## 5,400 TONS OF BOMBS DAILY IS NEW SCHEDULE

GUAM, June 15 (Friday) — (A P) — American planes will begin hitting Japan with bombs at the rate of 2,000 tons a year by July 1, Gen. H. H. Arnold announced today in a press conference at the very moment 520 Superfortresses were dumping a 3,000-ton load on the great industrial city of Osaka.

The raid, marking the first anniversary of B-29 operations against Japan proper, struck Osaka and the neighboring city of Amagasaki.

Gen. Arnold, chief of the U.S. Army Air Forces, announced the Osaka raid in disclosing his program for "complete and utter destruction" of the enemy homeland by air. He is here on a visit to the 21st Bomber Command, headquarters of the B-29 Superfortresses.

The planned 2,000,000 annual bomb tonnage would average 5,480 tons each day.

### Australians Capture Brunei

MANILA, June 15 (Friday) — (AP) — Australian forces have captured the town of Brunei, capital of the Borneo protectorate of the same name, it was announced today.

LONDON, June 15 (AP) — The British Government today offered India a new constitution council with only two posts held by Britons — a move which a white paper called a "genuine step forward" toward Indian self-government.
