This Company was started in a small way in the year 1922 with a staff of eight men, their chief business being local repairs and steamboat work. From year to year new buildings were added until about 120 men were employed with Foundry, Machine Shop, Boiler Shop, Forge, and Plumbering and Manufacturing Departments. Unmarried Truro Mother Acquitted

TRURO, N.S., Jan 10 — (CP) — An unmarried mother, Muriel Mae Taylor, of nearby New Glasgow was acquitted at a preliminary hearing today on a charge that she neglected to provide reasonable assistance to the care of a child with whom she had a custody agreement, with intent that the child should die.

The charge arose out of an investigation by Royal Canadian Mounted Police in December, when two infant bodies were found at the Taylor home.

Miss Taylor's mother, Mrs. Matilda Taylor, also was acquitted of a charge that "she did unlawfully dispose of the dead body of a child with intent to conceal the fact that Muriel Taylor was delivered of the child."

Magistrate John L. Crowe said he was not condoning the actions he accused but the Crown had not produced a case of intent and there was no other course but dismissal.

VOTE FOR THE SLATE

Says De Gaulle Plans To Become Dictator

MELBOURNE, Jan. 9 — (CP)—A.E. Monk, secretary of the Australian Council of Trades Unions, asserted today that European Fascism "is an organized form" and that Gen. De Gaulle was planning to set himself up as dictator of France.

He said the totalitarian ideology would "cause further disruption unless the United Nations take action."

Gen. de Gaulle, he declared, is playing "a shrewd game, encouraging a coalition of Communists, Socialists and Roman Catholic parties in a political and economic madhouse, awaiting the inevitable crash before seizing the opportunity to start a dictatorship."
