### WELL DESERVED PUNISHMENT.

Judge Scott, of New York, has been given unstinted praise by the press of that city for imposing the full penalty of the law on Al. Adams, the so-called policy king, found guilty before him of fraud in carrying on the policy system of gambling. In passing sentence, Judge Scott denounced Adams as a lawbreaker in a very mean and sordid sense, by his playing on the weakness and frailties of mankind, and fattening upon the pennies of the poor. The evidence showed that in the west side of Manhattan island only, the territory apportioned by the Tammany vice trust to Adams, the receipts were nearly seven thousand dollars a day. On this basis the business done in the entire city of New York was estimated at about seven and a half million dollars. One million of this went to the police for protection. The amount given in prizes was less than the sum paid for what was practically a license to rob. The system was so worked that Adams could regulate the amount paid in prizes, and select the persons, when he so willed, who would get the best. Captain Goddard, of the Anti-Policy Society, who was largely instrumental in securing the convention of Adams, stated that the profits on the game amounted to fully one-third of the receipts. The enormous total came almost wholly from the poor, and in large part from the children of the poor. These represented in part the proceeds of theft, and of the remainder there was not one dollar in ten that the loser could afford to part with. Policy

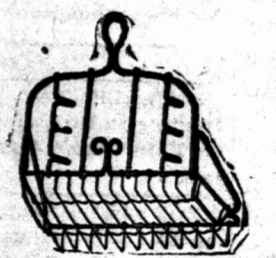

slips were often found on the floor where families had been evicted for non-payment of rent. In the palmy days of the 'graft,' policy gambling amounted to a craze, and the small sums needed for ventures drew even the newsboys and beggars into the game, furnishing another proof that it is out of the small but numerous contributions of the poor that some colossal financial results have been obtained. The inherent rascality of policy dealing was frequently exposed in the newspapers, but no amount of exposure had any effect on the popular lunacy till the law was invoked, and its true inwardness fully exposed in the courts. Our experience of the game in Montreal was similar to that of New York, only we had not the satisfaction of seeing the men who played it condemned to a full term in the penitentiary.

### BARR'S COLONY.

The hardships endured by the Barr colony as told in our despatches yesterday seem not to be growing less. Writing from Battleford on April 30 the special correspondent of the Winnipeg Telegram says:

"Part of the Barr colony has arrived here, after a journey filled with hardships. The rest are struggling in singly or in small parties. In all, about fifty settlers' wagons and a dozen transports have made the half way station, after a very rough trip. Nearly a dozen wagons have pressed forward under guides, while the rest are in camp here awaiting the arrival of Mr. Barr to give them their location. Those who were discontented at Saskatoon are in no better mood after their venturesome journey through muskies and over difficult roads. The tents and stores of wood and hay, placed at intervals of twenty miles by agents of the government, have been a great convenience to the colonists and averted much suffering. The road just out of Saskatoon and the last twenty-five miles traversed to reach Battleford were in a very bad condition. The musky outside of Saskatoon caused several to turn back and many had to lighten their loads. Several horses along the way were killed by careless driving. Monday was bitterly cold, and women and children who had to walk suffered greatly. A dozen young Englishmen who had their goods freighted up here are in a quandary, as they cannot get work. The balance of the journey westward is looked forward to with some apprehension, as arrangements from now out for stopping stations are incomplete."

The Patrie, of Paris, announces that President Roosevelt will visit France officially in July. It is an unwritten law that the President of the United States shall not set foot on foreign soil during his term of office, so that the only way the visit can be arranged is by the annexation of France before July.

Discussing the Frank disaster the New York Herald states that it is an illustration of the unsuspected leveling power of atmospheric agencies acting incessantly and perfectly on giant mountain masses. It recalls, in this connection, the downfall of the Rossberg, the highest peak in the Swiss Alpine range, the Wildspitz, which occurred on September 2nd, 1806. It was the result of a very rainy season. On that occasion the fall of the enormous amount of rock caused friction which produced jets of fire and gave the appearance of a volcanic eruption. This probably explains the fact that it was supposed at first that the Turtle Mountain disaster was of volcanic origin. Nature, was, it appears, merely leveling down the Rockies, and she will keep at the work until there are no Rockies left to level.

### FINAL WARNING TO BULGARIA.

LONDON, May 5.—The Vienna correspondent of the Daily Telegraph says the Turkish ambassador at Vienna acting on the Porte's instructions, has requested Austria-Hungarian Minister of foreign affairs, Count Goluchowski, to address a final warning to Bulgaria, and the Count while expressing regret that the Turkish precautions were so inadequate, the outrages having been foretold, has promised to intervene at Sofia.
