RIO ALTO RANCH SOLD—The High River, Alta Times says: "We are informed that this well known ranching property, on the North Fork of High River, has recently changed hands, and that Mr. J. Walter Ings has sold out his interests to Mr. P. Burns of Calgary. This property consists of ten thousand acres of freehold land, and between eight and nine thousand acres of leasehold, with one thousand to eleven hundred head of well bred cattle, and fifty horses, together with all the improvements, buildings, fences, etc. necessary for a first-class going concern. We have not heard the exact price paid, as the cattle have not yet been counted out, but understand it is well on to a quarter of a million dollars. Messrs. Ings Bros. started cattle and horse ranching on Rio Alto Ranch in the early days, F. W. Ings, coming West from P. E. Island in the fall of 1883, being joined by his brother in the spring of 1884. They continued on in business together until the summer of 1900, when they dissolved partnership, J. Walter buying out his brother's interest, and continuing on the cattle business, and F. W. going to Nanton, Alberta, where he is engaged in farming on an extensive scale, and also runs a large bunch of cattle and horses. We understand Mr. Ings and family will move over to Vancouver, where he has some extensive land and mining investments, which require looking after, and will give him something to occupy his leisure time. Mr. Burns has secured one of the best ranching properties in Alberta, and with his well known business capacity, will no doubt make as great a success of it, as his predecessor had done."

TORONTO, Sept. 6—Died of wounds, W. Martin Eldon, Belfast P.E.I. J. A. McMillan, St. Peter's Bay.

Mr. Samuel Corney of S. Side received the sad news yesterday stating that his son Sydney had made the supreme sacrifice. Pte. Corney enlisted with the original 105th Batt., crossed over to England and drilled there until his opportunity came to fall in line for France, where he nobly performed his duty till Aug. 25th when he died from the effects of a bad wound in the head. Pte. Corney was in his early twenties and was a member of Prince Edward Lodge, I.O.O.F. Previous to enlistment he was drug clerk in the store of Mr. P. N. Enman, where his cheery smile and pleasant manner made him a general favorite. To the bereaved parents, sisters and brothers, the deepest sympathy of the whole community is extended.

Mrs. Charles Doucette, S. Side received word yesterday that her son, Pte. Ernest Doucette, Infantry, was killed in action, Aug. 24.

Pte. Doucette was bugler with the 105th Batt., while stationed at S. Side and was a general favorite.

Mr. George Cobb of Moncton, formerly of S. Side received word yesterday that his son, Pte. Wm. Cobb, Infantry is officially reported admitted to Gen. Hospital, Aug. 28. Gunshot wounds right leg.

Mrs. Ernest McQuarrie received word yesterday that her husband had been officially admitted to 12th Stationary Hospital, Aug. 27, with gunshot wound in neck.

Mrs. Arbing Bowness, S. Side received word yesterday that her son, Gordon W. Arbing had been admitted to the 54th General Hospital, Aug. 29, gassed and wounded.

Mr. Ephraim Pineau S. Side received news yesterday that his son, Michael Pineau, has been admitted to 4th General Hospital, Camiers, Aug. 29, gunshot wound in face.

Corey Steeves, Calgary, formerly of S. Side was notified yesterday that his son, Arthur Steeves, infantry was admitted to 56th General Hospital, on Aug. 23, with gunshot wound in hand.

Mrs. Fred Farrant, S. Side received word yesterday that her brother Frank Mutart was admitted to the 56th General Hospital, Aug. 29, with gunshot wounds in left side.

Mr. Phillip Murphy of Sturgeon received a telegram yesterday that his only son, Pte. Nicholas Murphy had been admitted to the Rouen General Hospital on the 29th August, suffering from a multiple gunshot wounds. Pte. Murphy, who was a P. W. C. Murphy is a brother of Miss Mary Murphy of the Bank of Nova Scotia, City.

McDonald had been admitted to the Rouen General Hospital, Aug. 29, suffering from a gunshot wound in the foot. Pte. McDonald was one of the P. E. Island's most successful teachers, enlisted in the 105th Batt. in March, 1915, was transferred to the 104th Batt. and later to the "Fighting 26th."

Mrs. Edward Irving, Charlottetown received word yesterday that her brother, Pte. Douglas Carr, who enlisted in Regina in the 46th Sask. atchean Regiment, was wounded. He is a son of Mr. Ralph Carr, formerly of Covehead and now of Regina.
