TRAVEL BOOM FORECAST
LONDON, Oct. 3 — (CP) — Cheap winter fares and devaluation of the pound may result in one of the biggest air-travel booms since the war. Sixty-day winter excursion rates became effective today and return fares were dropped by approximately one-third. The normal return fare dropped \$173.20 to \$488.50.

IN MEMORIAM
C RAY MORRIS
The death of C. Ray Morris of North Granville took place at his home on Monday morning, Sept. 19th at the comparatively early age of 68 years. He was the youngest of the family of the late Mr. and Mrs. W. Cyrus Morris, and lived on the farm property which has been in the family name for upwards of one hundred and fifty years. He was incapacitated for work about six years ago by a slight stroke, but it was not until about two years ago that he became unable to move about with freedom, and still later that he became totally dependent. During all this time that his strength was failing — and he had been liberally endowed — he was never heard to utter a single word of complaint. He faced the inevitable with a quiet resignation that spoke more strongly than words of the reality and pressure of the Great Helper and Guide in whom he put his trust. He was a member of Prince Edward Lodge, No. 14, A.F. and A.M., and of the Grand Lodge of Prince Edward Island. He was also an adherent of the United Church. The funeral was very largely attended by people from many parts of the Island, and was held from his late home at 2 o'clock on Wednesday afternoon, Sept. 21st, under the direction of Mr. Davidson, undertaker of Summerside. The floral tributes were very beautiful. The services at both home and grave were conducted by Rev. Mr. McPhail, assisted by Rev. W.L. Green, and Mr. Ernest Dunning. The latter, on behalf of the Lodge, read from memory the very impressive Masonic ritual at both home and cemetery. The burial was in the family plot in the United Church cemetery at Granville. The pallbearers were Hubert Morris, Charles D. Wright,
