THE Mr. and Mrs. McDonald mentioned in the following from an American paper, will be remembered as the regular summer visitors to this province who built the elegant and comfortable cottage Dalvay at Tracadie:

Handsome gift to Cincinnati. The event of last week in Cincinnati, Ohio, was the dedication and presentation of a new wing to the Presbyterian Hospital, the gift of Mr. and Mrs. Alexander McDonald. Mr McDonald is a rich Scotch Presbyterian elder of the highest repute. He is president of the local branch of the Standard Oil Company. The gift is believed to equal \$75,000, and is a supplement to gifts of a like character to the same institution. The building is a beautiful brick structure, faced with stone, and has a capacity of fifty beds, twenty-five having been previously provided for by the same donors in another building. The latter edifice resembles the best equipped hospitals in all its appointments. The Laura Memorial Medical College, costing about \$60,000, and intended for the education of female physicians and especially medical missionaries, was also presented to the Presbyterian Church some time ago by Mr. and Mrs. McDonald. They had a lovely daughter, an only child, greatly beloved by them and a general favorite in Cincinnati. She was a young wife and mother, but was taken from them. Their lives were greatly saddened by her death, but have been much comforted by the presence of her two beautiful little girls, whom they retain in their home. The Laura College is a memorial of the departed daughter, and the later hospital gift was largely inspired by her memory and spirit. The two institutions are on the same grounds and closely connected in every way.

A pleasing feature of the evening was the presentation to her of an address and a handsome photograph album as a small token in recognition of the services which she has rendered to the school, having been organist there for many years. Miss Blanche Craig, from Emerald, is expected to be present and take part in the musical part of the program.—On Saturday while Mr. Wm. Brown was engaged in moving an outbuilding, the props slipped and the building fell suddenly on his son Harry, a child of about twelve years of age. One leg was broken below the knee, the bone protruding through the flesh. He was attended to by Dr. McKay, Kensington, and Dr. Johnson, Emerald, who set the broken bones. He is suffering a great deal from his back, but there are no indications of any serious injury to it.

ELMSDALE NOTES.—The few days of cold winter-like weather of last week have been followed by a spell of soft damp weather and as a result the roads which were good for hauling are again in a wretched condition. Quite an amount of farm produce of various kinds has been shipped from our railway station during the last few weeks. Prices which were very low at first of season have advanced considerably. Oats which were 25 to 26 cents in October are now in demand at 30 cents. Potatoes too have gone up from 15 to 20 cents. On the other hand pork has declined from 1/2 to 3/4 ct per lb.—Rumor has it that our local post office is to be changed and that Mr. John C. Bearsto has been appointed to that position in place of Mr. L. C. Hayden. We have no doubt that Mr. Bearsto will prove an efficient and obliging postmaster.—The usual exodus to the States from our village and vicinity has taken place this fall. Among others Mr. George Rennie, son of Mr. L. Rennie our leading merchant, goes south for the winter for the benefit of his health which has not been very good for some time past.—Mr. and Mrs. John Burke have gone to New York, where Mrs. Burke has two brothers, Messrs. Malcolm and John Ramsay, who have long been residents of that city. Messrs. Bruce Currie, Melville Arthur and some others of our young men have also gone to that land of promise with the hope of bettering their circumstances for the future.—Mr. Benjamin Haywood, jr., who started for the Klondyke in the spring, but whose health did not warrant him in continuing the journey, is home again and is likely to remain for the winter.
