**DIED FROM ACCIDENT.**—The funeral of James Curtis MacKinnon took place from Cut Knife, Sask. to Paynton Cemetery, August 22nd, 1918. Deceased met with a very sad accident on Tuesday morning, August 20th, which resulted in his death. In trying to uncouple a trailer from his car, the tongue of the trailer flew up striking him on the neck and breaking it. Death was instantaneous. He leaves to mourn, a wife, five children, a mother, three brothers and two sisters. Mr. MacKinnon was a son of the late John H. MacKinnon of this city.

**FORMER ISLANDER.**—Rev. Bernard J. McKinnon, for the past several years chaplain of Providence Hospital, Oakland, has been at Livermore for several weeks recuperating from erysipelas and pneumonia, says the Oakland Calif. Maple Leaf. On May 7th he was taken with the former in the head and before he had completely recovered he was taken with the latter. He is now pretty well and is likely to replace his cousin, Rev. D. J. McKinnon, if the latter makes a trip to the East, the land of the Wise Men. During his stay in Providence Hospital, Father McKinnon has been a helpful and consoling friend to the sick and dying patients of his faith. He is a native of P. E. Island.

**CITY COUNCIL.**—The City Council met in regular monthly session on Monday evening, Mayor Wright presiding. There were also present Health Officer McMillan, M. D., and all the Councilors. A communication was read from the law firm of McLean and McKinnon, re the application of Miss Hilda Pidgeon for a settlement for injuries received and stating that if something was not done an action for damages against the city would be taken. The communication was referred to the Recorder, Coun. McKinnon, submitted particulars of recent improvements made to certain streets. Coun. Yeo expressed his pleasure at hearing of these improvements and said it bore out his contention that the improvements were feasible. Coun. Smith spoke of the nuisance caused by "balm o' Gilead" trees in the city and said he would move a motion next meeting to have them all removed. He also gave notice that he would introduce a motion next meeting to have all persons peddling vegetables etc., in the city pay a tax. Coun. Miller brought up the subject of lawlessness on the part of so many small boys in the city, firing stones, damaging property, etc., and thought some means should be taken to see what could be done to put a stop to it. The Mayor named Couns. Yeo, Miller and Rattray as a committee to consider some method of dealing with the problem. Council adjourned.
