THE PROHIBITION ACT.

In this issue we publish a letter from R. C. Goff, formerly President of the Provincial Temperance Alliance. The letter explains itself, Mr. Goff is not President of the Alliance; the Alliance has not been consulted; the Government, without advice from or consultation with any recognized temperance organization, has taken the enforcement of the Act into its own hands; it has dismissed officials whom the temperance people of the province, by public resolution and otherwise, endorsed as capable and substituted, on other recommendation than that of the formerly recognized temperance leaders, men of their own choosing.

All this, and more, in a Christian province, with Christian laws, with a law prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquors!

Now let it not be forgotten that the management of the gatherings above mentioned were in no way to blame for the disgraceful scenes enacted. The conditions were in defiance of their efforts to maintain order. The liquor was brought to the crowd, sold to the crowd and the crowd got drunk and uncontrollable. The same conditions are likely to occur in the case of any gathering, regardless of its respectability, its object or its efforts.

This then is the enforcement of the law for which, as Mr. Goff says, the people "have been patiently waiting." The cases mentioned are extreme, it is true, but extreme only in the fact that the occasions were extraordinary. The gatherings were large and the effect was correspondingly large. On a smaller scale, in individual cases, the same "enforcement" is being given the Prohibition Act throughout the province. Liquor is being sold without any regard to the law, being sold so openly that whoever wants it can get it.

Mr. Goff says "there is much disapproval" with the manner in which the Act is being enforced. He might have gone much further; there is not only disapproval, there is disgust, indignation, humiliation. There is a general feeling that the province is disgraced before the eyes of those who, only a short time ago, looked up to us as a people who had set an example for the world to follow, an example which others have been trying to follow.

Within the last week there have been several large gatherings at different points of the Province, the Orange celebration at Kelvin, the Riverside races, the League of the Cross picnic. At each of the scenes of drunkenness and rowdiness, of fighting and blasphemy were simply indescribable. Liquor was sold in the adjoining groves by fakirs; men, boys were drunk and fighting; broken hearted mothers and wives and sisters were jostled and hustled by the maddened mob as they tried in vain to quiet a rum-maddened son or husband or brother, or rescue him from a situation in which his own or some other's madness had placed him.

It is no use mincing matters any longer. Patience under present conditions is no longer a virtue. It is criminal. While young lives are being ruined, while hearts are being broken through our neglect, we are masquerading before the world as "the banner Prohibition Province of Canada." In Heaven's name let us either throw off the mask and stand before the world as what we are or put our feet down like men and demand that the Act shall be enforced. If the Government has been negligent, careless, or playing falsely with the question let it not be forgotten that the people are the Government and that it is upon them that the stigma rests. We are our brothers' keeper and we shall be held responsible for the manner of our keeping. Let the temperance people wake up. If your advice and your counsel are not asked for, then give your advice and your counsel and demand that they be acted upon. The Prohibition Act can be enforced. It is only in the world's slums that law and order cannot be enforced and we are still about the slums.

inspection that all the emphasis, so far, has been placed upon the danger to human life involved in the absence of inspection. We are not minimizing this danger when we direct attention to another and very serious, though a more materialistic one, the double danger of having our best herds depleted by tuberculosis and consequently being shut off from selling abroad either our cattle or our products. It is known that tuberculosis exists among cattle in certain sections of the province; it is known also that tuberculosis is highly infectious, so much so that the law demands that all animals known to be affected with the disease shall be killed and the remains so disposed of as to prevent the possibility of contact with other animals.

So much is known. What is not known is the extent to which the disease exists. It is not known, absolutely, whether or not the best herds in the province are affected unless there has been a thorough and scientific inspection. Among the most promising herds there may be one or more diseased animals which may be the means of infecting and ruining the whole herd. Would not ordinary prudence suggest, under these circumstances, that, the only means within

reach, namely, the tubercular test, be applied either to make assurance doubly sure or to know the worst and so save the rest of the herd?

The prudent herd owner does this without any legal compulsion. He does it as a matter of ordinary, common sense business prudence as he would remove the danger of fire from his buildings. But what of the imprudent herd owner? From his un-inspected herd may come the danger of infection to other herds. The law will not permit him to keep on his premises anything that would be a menace to his neighbor's property—except diseased cattle. This, unfortunately and strangely, the law allows in our province today.

It is unnecessary to state the conclusion of the whole matter. The inspection of all cattle, once a year, should be made compulsory by law, if for no higher consideration than to save our property and to conserve our business. And we feel satisfied that, when the actual condition of affairs is disclosed by such inspection, there will be general thankfulness on the part of our farmers that inspection was made compulsory and many regrets that the law had not been enacted long before.

NOTES.

The strangers within our gates continue to be bamboozled, and missioned and put upon and educated—and everything but intelligently understood. We will do anything in the world for them—and to them—except set our imaginations at work in an effort to find out what they are, and why. We just marvel at them, that they can actually come to this Heaven-blessed country and really see our superior selves living, and yet go on being so unlike us as they manage to do. How obdurate they must be! Why we should think that one good look at a Canadian would convince them that they were all wrong when they differed from that "specimen brick" and see them copying us like so many industrious monkeys. Well it doesn't. They pick up our language in such broken fragments as they find most easily masticated; and they pick up a living after the manner of their own kind; and they have their quarrels and their pleasures—and they usually go about both of them in a fashion which brings them into collision with our laws. Doubtless, they wonder at us quite as much as we wonder at them; but we are both very slow at understanding each other. And mutual understanding must come before we get very far on the road toward assimilation.
