"Our republics began their existence as independent States protected by the United States and England against the possible aggression of the Holy Alliance. For that reason the names of Canning, Henry Clay, and Monroe, the first friends of the nations of Latin America, are always gratefully remembered by the people of this continent. "The present war proves conclusively that our young Republics will need the protection of the United States in order to live peacefully with each other and to be assured freedom from aggression on the part of the military powers of the Old World which aspire to control our destinies. Germany was on the point to provoke a war of conquest in Latin America in order to be better prepared to fight the United States and England. Fortunately that infernal scheme has failed completely. "In the midst of the great world strife, the peace in Latin America is due to the attitude of the United States, which like a guardian angel, watches over the welfare of our countries. The Government at Washington does not demand any material aid from these countries; she only asks for their moral support and that they oppose all schemes of German intrigue while she devotes herself to the work of defending the liberties of mankind on the seas and on the battlefields of Western Europe. "The moral support has not been denied; it has been given with all spontaneity and enthusiasm as it was natural that all democracies of America would accompany her with plaudits and with fondest hopes for the triumph of the good cause. The friendly attitude of Brazil, Argentina, Uruguay, and Guatemala is in an especial manner an eloquent demonstration of American union. Paraguay shares in this sentiment, as she has given evidence of her sincere adhesion to the cause which the United States and other powers of the Entente defend. "I believe that I do not fall short of the truth when I say that men in public life in Paraguay think as follows: "1. That were it not for the power and benevolence of the United States toward her sister Republics they would have been oppressed or subjected to anarchy by foreign powers. "2. That among the Republics themselves peace would not be assured but for the respect that they owe to the United States. "3. That there is no reason to mistrust the United States so long as our Republics respect themselves and each other as civilized countries respect the rights of others. "And, being Americans, we congratulate the people and Government of Argentina for the cordial reception which they have just given to the United States fleet."
