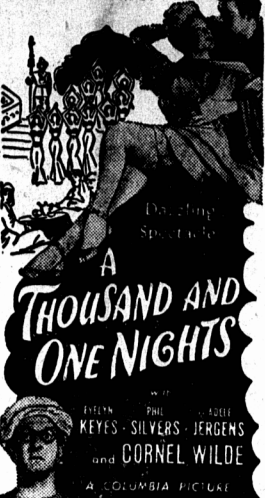

S'side Kinsmen To Entertain On Hallow'en

All the children of the town will be guests of the Kinsmen Club of Summerside on Hallow'en at a party to be held at the Crystal Rink. They will be treated to candy, apples and oranges, and entertainment will be provided. At the same time they will turn in their Shell-Out tickets which they have collected and the prize winners will be decided.

The Shell-Out Campaign was conducted last year for "Milk for Britain" but now the Association of Kinsmen Clubs have sufficient money on hand to fulfill their obligations to English children for 1945 and the proceeds this year will be devoted to local youth welfare. At the last meeting of the Kinsmen Club of Summerside the amount of \$1,000 was voted to install radios in the schools if the consent of the authorities is received. The club had previously decided to sponsor a juvenile hockey team this year which will be in charge of Charlie Hogan.

In order to encourage the youngsters to take part in the Shell-Out campaign prizes have been put up for selling and collecting. The first prize for selling is \$20 and the second prize \$10. In addition there is a prize of \$5 for the pupil in each classroom that sells the most tickets. For collecting the first prize is \$20 and the second \$10. No child may win more than one prize.

The tickets are being distributed to the children through the cooperation of the principal and teachers of the High School and the Sisters of St. Mary's Academy to whom the club is very grateful. One of the purposes of the Shell-Out campaign is to teach the children to want to help others and

that is why they are asked to accept Shell-Out tickets on Hallow'en night instead of treats. It is also intended to occupy the children as much as possible at legitimate purposes and keep them out of mischief. People who buy Shell-Out tickets will have the satisfaction of knowing that their money will be devoted to a worthy cause.
