S., who is presiding at the convention. Large numbers of delegates are in attendance and all parts of the Maritime Provinces are represented at the convention. In the morning and afternoon sessions yesterday excellent reports were heard, an impressive memorial service was conducted and officers were elected. In the evening the Rebekah degree was impressively conferred by Pearl Lodge, No. 9, of Moncton, and later the Odd Fellows and Rebekahs were guests of the Saint John members at a reception and dance under the auspices of Jewel and Sapphire Lodges of Saint John.

In the morning the opening of the twenty-ninth session of the Rebekah Assembly was preceded by a parade from the Admiral Beatty Hotel to Trinity Hall, led by commanding officer, L.
