The Pulpit is artistically beautiful, and has an inset bronze tablet containing the names of the fallen. The musical part of the service will be adopted to the occasion and a special sermon will be preached by Rev. Dr. Fullerton. Col. R. H. Campbell will hand over the memorial to the church and Col. D. Stewart will perform the ceremony of unveiling, after which the dedication will take place. A special invitation is extended to all returned men to participate in this service, sacred to the memory of their fallen comrades.

THE WEATHER.—There was a sudden and very decided change in the atmospheric conditions yesterday over that of the previous day. The mild spring-like weather of Wednesday morning gave place by evening to something after the Arctic style, the mercury dropping with marked suddenness to within seven degrees of the zero mark and a howling gale from the Northwest direction setting in which continued all night and in somewhat abated form all day yesterday. The high wind and low temperature made a condition of atmosphere which was anything but pleasant to be out in. During the gale Wednesday night a large balm 'O' Gileed tree near the corner of Pownall and Dorchester Street, was blown down and fell against a house, where it remained all day yesterday, a rather dangerous obstruction. A large pane of glass in the Victoria Hotel barber shop was also blown in by the gale and no doubt damage was done in other places.
