INNOCENT OF CRIME WORE LAST WORDS OF SUICIDE.

LONDON, Ont., Oct. 5.—"If anything should happen to me, remember I am innocent of stealing, not knowing the horses to be stolen, and I do not believe the judge thought me guilty. He sentenced me because he is hardened to such proceedings. Life is not worth to live five years in hell, so good-by, may God have mercy on the souls of those who swore my life away. Good-by, all."

MAY BE CASE OF MURDER.

SYDNEY, Oct. 7.—There have been some interesting developments in connection with the death of Enrico Moggiotto, the Italian found Friday at Dominion with his throat cut. New facts brought out Saturday by the police would indicate that a murder had been committed, though all evidence is purely circumstantial.

Miller, the man who found the deceased, says that when he came out of the house where the dead man lay, he saw a man running toward the railway, and boarding a Glace Bay car. The conductor of the same car noticed an Italian on his car who acted rather suspiciously. He got off before the car reached Glace Bay. The man who was seen on the car, and who is supposed to have been the last with deceased was about 35 or 40 years old, stood about 5 feet 6 inches high, weighed 140 pounds and wore a light suit and cap.

The window of the room where the deceased lay was found open by the police when they arrived. The woman Rosa, however, says there was no one in the house but herself and the man as far as she knew. He was in the first room and there was one room between that and the kitchen, where she was. She heard a man screaming shortly after he had left her to go into the room.
