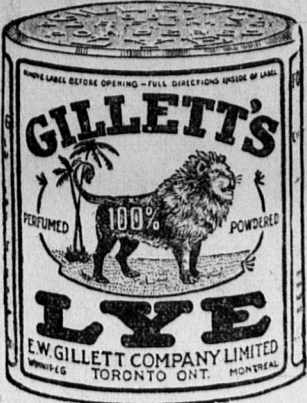

OUR LONDON LETTER

(Continued from page 4.) always hopeful that it might be possible to establish a service of ferries between Newfoundland and some port on the Quebec side. He was informed, however, by the authorities that there were two fatal reasons against that. One was that the flow of the tide was too great to make a car service possible, and the other was that the seas were often so rough in the Gulf of St. Lawrence as to make it unsafe for the carriage of a train inside a vessel. New, however, he came to Walker, and not for the first time in his experience, he found that Armstrongs had done the impossible. He was told that when ever there was an impossible problem puzzling the ingenuity of people, the first step was to come to Armstrongs and then get the puzzles satisfactorily settled for them. In conclusion, Earl Grey mentioned that he had been to Prince Edward Island, and he spoke in eloquent terms of its beauty, charm and fertility. He looked for great results from the new service they had inaugurated that day. As it is intended to maintain service throughout all the seasons of the year, the vessel has been specially designed to cope with the severe ice conditions which obtain in winter in the Northumberland Strait. The principal dimensions are: Length, 300 ft.; breadth, 54 feet; depth, 24 ft. and the draft, when loaded with the largest cargo which are used on the Canadian Railway system, is 18 feet. Although the vessel is comparatively small, the propelling machinery is of considerable power and consists of three sets of triple expansion

engines, two of which are arranged aft and one forward. The scantlings are such that the machinery may be brought up all standing without damage when working at full power. Dining, smoking and drawing rooms, both for first and second class, are provided above the railway deck, and the decorations of the first class rooms is on a scale which is unusual in vessels of this class. Special means of ventilation for use during the summer, and liberal arrangements for heating during the winter months have been provided, so that the comfort of passengers will be ensured under the extreme temperatures which are experienced in this service.

It goes without saying that no news of the movements of our Canadian forces has been chronicled in the press on this side; yet it is generally supposed that they sailed on a certain date toward the close of September, and that they therefore must be due about this date, allowing progress at the speed of the slowest ship in the fleet. Colonel Carson has already arrived in an advance guard and spends his time between the War Office in London and the camps down on Salisbury Plain where it is believed the Canadian depot will be established.

In anticipation of the needs of our boys, the Ladies' Committee of the Canadian Contingent War Association are busily engaged at the Westminster, Palace Hotel in preparing garments and all sorts of comforts. Although the European winter has not the icy touch of "Our Lady of the Snows," many Canadians find the humidity much more penetrating than the cold of frost and snow.

The Queen's Canadian Military Hospital at Shorncliffe is now ready for use, but before the doors are thrown open, the War Office has to pay official visit and give approval of the arrangements. That this will readily be given there is no doubt, for everything has been done that money and thought are capable of doing to minister to the comfort and welfare of inmates. Although the residence of Sir Arthur and Lady Markham has been placed at the disposal of the committee free of cost, coupled with the use of farm produce and the provision of a complete X-ray outfit and other surgical apparatus, the scheme is going to cost money to maintain, and it is ardently hoped by the Canadian community here that Canada will generously come to their assistance. The Canada Lodge of Freemasons, represented by Mr. George McL. Brown and Mr. W. McLeod Moore, are co-operating most heartily and are looking for the sympathy of their brethren of the craft in the Dominion.

Before the mail leaves bearing this letter, it is likely that the first Canadian Contingent will have planted foot on English soil.
