

By the death of Mr. John Kelly, Postmaster at Kelly's Cross, on Jan. 14, an old landmark, as it were, has been removed from our midst. The deceased was possessed of many of the estimable traits found in the hardy Irish settlers of this part of the Province. His industry, his strict honesty, his love of truth and hatred of canting, his strict honesty, and were proverbial to his intimate friends. 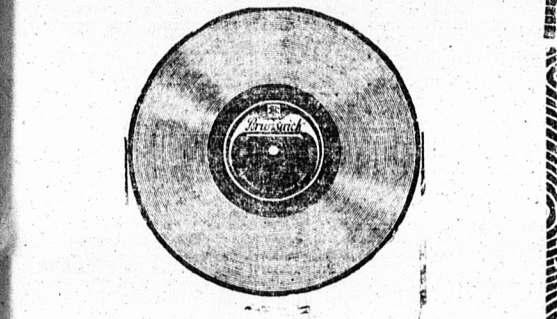
