Several months ago Isadora went to Moscow to establish a school to teach the Russian children impressionistic dancing, under the auspices of the Bolsheviks. In a letter to Humanite, the Socialist newspaper here, Isadora writes "You ask my impressions. 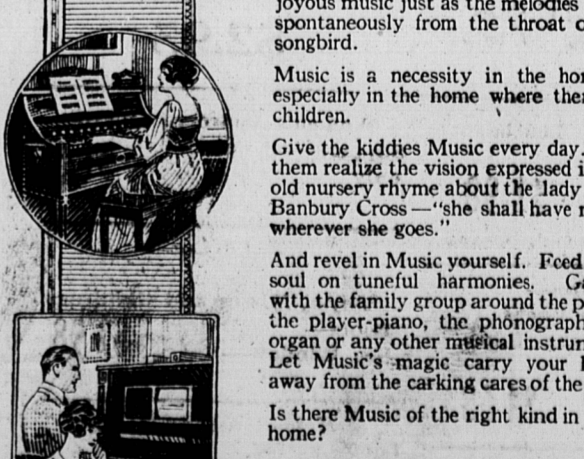
