DISASTROUS EARTHQUAKE

CONSTANTINOPLE, August 11.—Reports here today indicate that the great earthquake which was felt thru a great part of Turkey yesterday, was accompanied by much heavier loss of life than was at first stated. The newspapers today estimated the number of victims at a thousand killed, while the injured are said to number from five to six thousand. The details of the earthquake, which are coming in slowly, owing to the interruption of the wires indicate that the seismic disturbance was widespread. Several hundred persons have been killed, thousands are homeless, and outbreaks of fire have occurred in many of the towns and villages.

Great destruction has been caused by the upheaval. The entire district between Constantinople and Adria-nople is the shock severely. Fugitives from Myrtilite report 300 killed and 600 injured. The town was still burning when they left. Caposiora has been wiped out, eighty persons being killed and thirty wounded. The wrecked buildings took fire and most of them were burned to the ground. Sharko was completely destroyed and two nearby villages were engulfed.

Adrianople suffered little damage, but Thoru was partially destroyed by the earthquake and fire. The center of the disturbance appears to have been the region of the Dardanelles. Eye witnesses who have arrived here from that section give harrowing accounts of the havoc wrought. The majority of the houses in Gallipoli are in ruins and the people are stamping in fields.

MINISTER CHURCHILL ATTACKS BONAR LAW.

LONDON, Aug. 11.—Winston Spencer Churchill, first Lord of the Admiralty, in long letter issued tonight for publication in tomorrow morning's newspapers, makes a passionate attack upon A. Bonar Law denouncing leader's incitement of Ulster to resist Home Rule. Mr. Churchill compares Mr. Bonar Law's doctrines to those of Ben Tillett on tower hill, when the strike leader prayed with thousands of dock strikers that God would strike Lord Lansdowne dead. Mr. Churchill declares that such doctrines disqualify the conservative leader and those who support him, from the discharge of official responsibilities, and are doctrines by which every lawless or disruptive movement in any part of the empire, can justify and from maintaining a determined silence as which every street bully with a brick bat and every crazy fanatic fumbling with a pistol may derive inspiration.

A curious instance of how benevolent the public may become, when appealed to in the most artistic English manner, particularly those of the half-penny class, recently regaled their readers with heart-rending reports of the dire condition of the poor people on the lonely island of St. Kilda in the Outer Hebrides. One enterprising paper declared that, in consequence of storms, the islanders were almost starved, as they had received very few provisions during the winter.

THREATENED TO SHOOT.

HALIFAX, Aug. 12.—The sheriff's office had a rather exciting experience on Saturday about noon. Deputy Sheriff Malcolm levied on a horse, buggy and harness, under execution at suit of Book and Bennett vs. John W. Marsman. The rig was placed in a central livery stable to be held subject to the sheriff's orders. About 1.30 o'clock John W. Marsman and Daniel Halsey appeared at the livery stable and, taking possession of the horse, wagon and harness, drove off. The sheriff was at once notified, and set to work to recover the property stolen. Marsman left for his home in Hammonds Plains. Officer Reuben Purcell was notified at Fairview to arrest Marsman and hold the team. The officer had not long to wait, as his man was soon there. When he demanded the team and prisoner the latter drew a revolver and threatened to blow his brains out. Officer Purcell was not to be outdone by this. He telephoned to Deputy Sheriff Scriven. That officer left with team and soon they were hot on Marsman's trail. About seven miles out on the Hammonds Plains road they overtook their man, who was accompanied by a woman. The officers at once took hold of their prisoner, at the same time he called to the woman to take his gun, which she at once did. Officer Scriven seized the woman and took possession of the loaded revolver. Marsman was handcuffed and taken to jail in the same team he had just stolen. The prisoner will be arraigned today charged with stealing and carrying away property seized under lawful authority.

It will be remembered that about a year ago Officer Scriven was violently assaulted at Hammonds Plains, when he was seizing a piano under replevin.
