CANADIAN DECORATIONS.—General Orders, 1917, published in small booklet form contains a list of medals and decorations awarded by His Majesty for bravery by Canadian soldiers in action. The following reference is made to the late (Sergeant) P. H. "Trotter," son of Colonel Crockett of York, and brother of Mrs. (Capt.) A. R. B. Duck: For conspicuous gallantry in action. Although wounded he assumed command of his platoon, handling his men with great courage and initiative. He set a splendid example of coolness and ability throughout. Among those listed as having received the Meritorious Medal in recognition of valuable services rendered during the war is Quartermaster-Sergeant W. J. N. Gill of Pleasant Grove, P. E. I., a member of the Canadian Militia Staff Clerks, who enlisted in Ottawa. He is a cousin of Mr. W. F. H. Gill of Charlottetown.

POPULAR PHYSICIAN.—The Brandon Sun of April 23rd in referring to Dr. Jeremiah S. Clark formerly of Bay View and brother of Prof. J. A. Clark, City, says:—Hundreds of Brandon citizens heard with surprise this morning that another of the city's most popular physicians in the person of Dr. J. S. Clark had responded to a hurried call and left for overseas. The doctor had offered his services some time ago, and at the end of last week was informed by the authorities that he would be required to go abroad in charge of a draft for the Army Medical Corps. He was informed on Saturday while at Winnipeg, that he would probably leave in about a week's time, and that in the meantime Dr. Clark could return to Brandon with the view of settling up his business affairs. Dr. Clark returned home on Saturday evening, but found on arrival that a wife was awaiting him with the request that he report at once in Winnipeg, so as to leave for overseas immediately. It is understood that he will remain overnight in Winnipeg, and leave with a draft of sixty members of the Army Medical Corps from there. The information caused much surprise at the First Baptist church on Sunday morning as the doctor and his family are among the most useful and highly esteemed members of the congregation. Dr. Clark leaves Mrs. Clark and three children who will, it is understood, remain in residence in this city until his return home.

FUNERAL YESTERDAY.—The remains of the late Mr. John Johnston were laid to rest in the Catholic cemetery yesterday morning. At St. Dunstan's Cathedral a High Mass of Requiem was sung by Rev. J. P. Johnston, son of deceased, with Rev. M. J. Smith as deacon and Rev. Frank McQuaid as sub-deacon. The funeral cortege was a very large one. The pall bearers were the four sons and two grandsons. The service at the grave was conducted by Rev. Maurice McDonald.

SUCCESSFUL ISLANDER.—In the Yukon Council election held last month the returns received from the Bonanza District, showed that a Prince Edward Islander, Mr. Allan A. McMillan formerly of Wood Island's headed the Conservative poll. The Dawson Daily News in its issue of March 1st regarding the election said: "A. A. McMillan, the Conservative candidate of the district made the extraordinary record of getting the vote of every man on his own creek, Quartz, which is a high compliment to him by the people of his own community. The vote at Quartz showed 29 votes. Six of the voters split their votes, and six 'dumblers.' Mr. McMillan is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Ewen MacMillan of Wood Islands. He has resided in the North for some years but has many friends in his old island home who will be delighted to hear of his success.

TRAINING OF DISABLED SOLDIERS

(Canadian Press Despatch)

OTTAWA, Ont.—The system of training disabled soldiers for success in civilian life is being discussed at a conference here today of district vocational officers of the military hospital commission. Every soldier so disabled by his service that he cannot return to his former work is entitled to claim re-education for a new occupation. So far 407 men have come before the disabled soldiers training boards and 298 have had their applications granted. 83 are awaiting final decision and 26 have been found ineligible.

RUSSIAN DEMOCRATS DO NOT WANT SEPARATE PEACE WITH GERMANY

(Canadian Press Despatch)

PETROGRAD, via London, April 30.—It is evident from foreign telegrams that the attitude of the Russian democracy towards peace has been misconstrued and distorted by the foreign press. The desire for peace has become more widespread and articulate since the revolution, but it is based on entirely different conceptions from those entertained during the old regime. These new conceptions have nothing to do with a premature peace with Germany. As a matter of fact they have not yet taken any definite form, simply emanating from the new spirit of democracy which wishes to build a foundation for a durable world peace. The idea of a separate peace died here with the old regime.

Petrograd, via London.—An anti-peace procession, comprising of some one thousand of mailed, hand-garred and convalescent soldiers on foot or in motor lorries assembled this morning, outside the Cathedral, despite the keen frost and paraded the streets to the strains of "The Marseillaise," scores of one-legged men bearing military decorations, bravely hob-

British Captured Prisoners and a Machine Gun

(Canadian Press Despatch)

LONDON, Eng., April 30.—The capture of some prisoners and a machine gun in minor operations is reported in the official statement issued by the war office this morning. The statement says: "In a small local operation between Monchy Le Preux and the Scarpe river we captured a few prisoners and improved our position during the night. Our troops also made a successful raid north of Ypres capturing 18 prisoners and a machine gun."
