Resolutions

1. Resolve that we extend to the people of Springfield our hearty thanks for their kindness and hospitality in entertaining the members and visitors of the Grand Division in this annual session.

2. Whereas it is believed that some of our prohibitive officers are eagerly striving to have the law strictly enforced, still it is felt that in some communities there is a great deal of carelessness regarding not only the inefficiency of our officers but also regarding the sale of lemon extract by our storekeepers and licensed peddlers to boys in the district.

We would therefore urge upon our commission board chief inspector and excise officers to see that still greater efforts are made to have the law more strictly enforced in every detail. We would also call upon all of

our people to assist the officers in their strenuous work.

3. Whereas it is generally reported that at least some of our vendors appointed to sell intoxicating liquors for medical purposes are not adhering strictly to the hours as set by our law we would therefore request our Commission board to see that this is carried out as the law requires.

Also we would ask our Commission board to have our vendor stores throughout the Island closed on all public holidays and on Sundays.

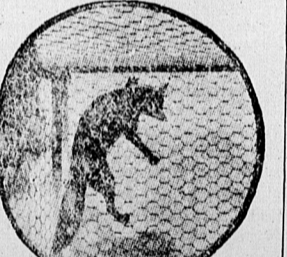

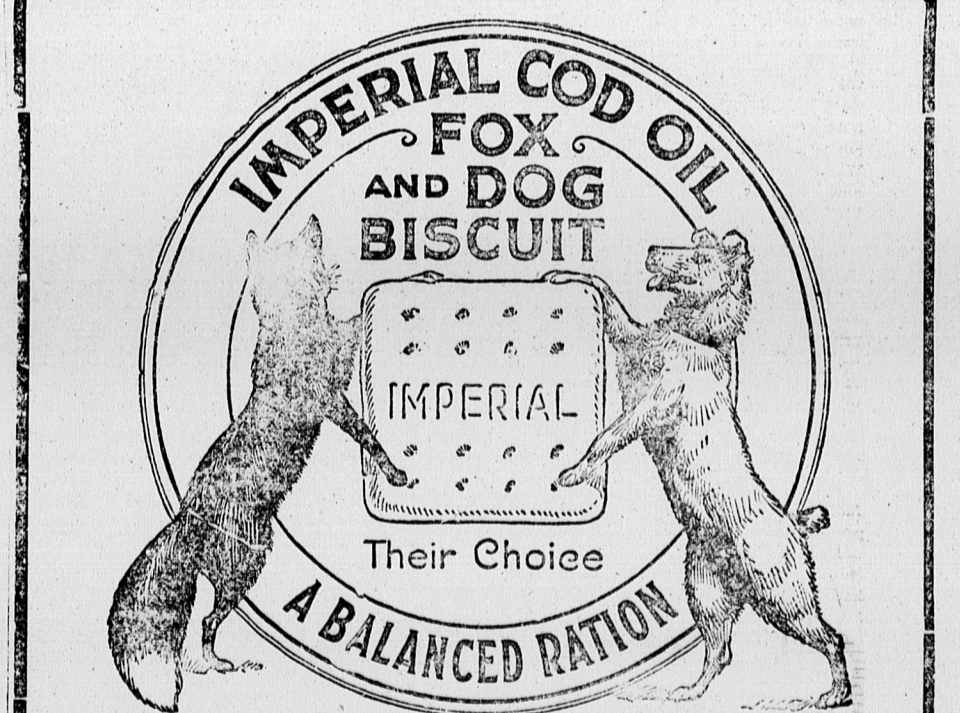
