CONSTABLE ARRESTED FOR SHOOTING AN INDIAN.

BRADFORD, Ont., Nov 2—David Garlow, Dominion constable of Ottawa, was arrested here yesterday by County Constable Kerr as a sequel to his shooting Curtis Martin, an Indian, at the Pagan Lighthouse late Saturday night. Garlow practically gave himself up, claiming he shot Martin while in the performance of his duty as constable. Some Pagan festivities were in progress at the council house, when a number of the participants the worse of liquor became disorderly. Constable Garlow was summoned by Chief General and arrested three Indians, Mawley Martin, Wilfred W. Corey and Hall Jameson, for being drunk. Garlow claimed with a fence rail and that he fired the bullets lodging in Martin's right knee and left ankle. The Constable proceeded with the three prisoners to Bradford, where he awaited his arrest. Martin will recover, one of the bullets having been extracted. Garlow is a man of powerful physique and his arrest was made on the ground that the shooting was unnecessary.
