NEIGHBORLY SYMPATHY

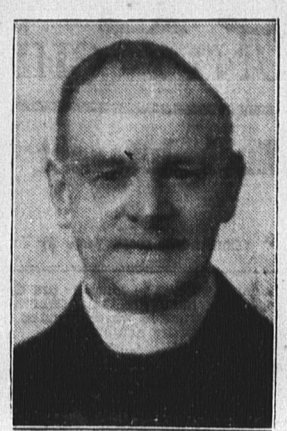

SACKVILLE, June 5.—A resolution deploring the lack of effective action by the government of Canada for the abolition of advertising and curtailment of the sale of liquor and another declaring that various organizations in seeking to aid the war effort by means of lotteries, wheels of fortune, bingo, door prizes, and other methods of chance were committing unlawful acts, were adopted at today's sessions of the Maritime Conference of the United Church in Canada.

Rev. F. E. Boothroyd, Sydney, succeeded Rev. Dr. Hugh Miller, Charlottetown, as president of the conference, while the Rev. Dr. St. Peter, N. S., was re-elected secretary and Rev. A. G. Pentz, Saint John, was re-elected assistant secretary.

Condemns Purchase of Tickets

Dr. H. R. Grant, secretary of the Social Service Council and Temperance Alliance, addressed the conference on the prevalence of gambling and the increasing use of liquor. He condemned the practice of Christians people indulging in the purchase of lottery tickets and the patronizing of gambling games, excusing the action by the argument that it is for a good purpose. Many, also, are ignorant not only of the laws governing gambling but of the vital principles involved.

Under the subject of gambling, the following was among the resolutions passed: Whereas during the war particularly fraternal and other organizations in seeking to give aid to war efforts, are resorting to the violation of the law relating to lotteries, the Maritime Conference while encouraging praiseworthy efforts to support the war, calls the attention of these societies and the people generally to the fact that it is unlawful to make or print lottery tickets, to advertise lotteries, to operate wheels of fortune, bingo, to offer door or gate prizes, or to dispose of property or money through any mode of chance, and to emphasize the truth that persons who have due regard for the duties of citizenship should observe all laws within our statutes.

Drink Traffic

Under the subject of liquor, the following resolution was presented and adopted: The Maritime Conference of the United Church of Canada deplores the fact that the government of Canada has taken no effective action in response to the request of the representatives of the Protestant and Roman Catholic churches and national organizations for the abolition of the advertising and the curtailment of the sale of liquor. "We cannot harmonize this neglect with the curtailment of other liberties and commodities which the government claims to be necessary for a total Canadian war effort, and we urge our governments to take immediate action to create an intelligent public opinion that will lead to the elimination of this waste in men and materials which is, in effect, seriously sabotaging our program of national war service.

Would Prohibit Manufacture

"We respectfully suggest that the

government prohibit for the duration of the war the manufacture of alcohol for beverage purposes which last year, it is claimed, used up \$15,000,000 worth of foodstuffs, and that our distilling facilities should be employed instead in the production of industrial alcohol for fuel, munition making and the manufacture of artificial rubber.

"We urge all our ministers, church officials, Sunday School superintendents and teachers to give leadership in an intensive campaign of education and enlistment of total abstinence, and for the mobilization of public opinion and voting power to secure the deliverance of our land from the spiritual and moral and economic loss now being sustained in our school curriculum and the consumption of intoxicants.

Scores Complacency

Rev. P. G. Gilchrist of Sydney seconded the resolution and scored the complacency with which the government and public had ignored the ravages of the liquor traffic in the production and military efficiency of the nation.

A speaker advocated the picket line about liquor stores if the government persists in ignoring the petitions and resolutions of the church. Another suggested that the secretary be authorized to ask each member at Ottawa to state his position on the question of liquor curtailment.

The president of the Lay Association assured the conference that it would be solidly behind whatever effort might be made. Mr. G. S. Sisco, secretary of the United Church of Canada, strongly supported the resolution offered by the speaker and spoke of the rising tide of indignation at the government's indifference in such a time of crisis.

Morning Session

Dr. Hugh Miller, the retiring president, addressed the conference. He thanked them for the honor accorded him during the past year and gave a resume of the presidential duties which he had fulfilled. He spoke of the still present cloud of war.

The secretary of the conference, Rev. G. A. Christie, read a message to the conference from Rev. Aubrey Tuttle, moderator of the United Church of Canada. He also read an fraternal greeting from the moderator of the Maritime Synod of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, Rev. Luther Young, in which he wished every success in the great work of the church.

Satchin Leader (Rev.) N. M. Slaughter of the R. A. F., a member of the Methodist Church in England, was invited to the platform and welcomed by the president. The conference then proceeded to the election of officers. A number of names were presented in nomination. Prince Edward Island, Sydney, Pictou, Annapolis and Yarmouth presbytery nominated Rev. F. E. Boothroyd, of Trinity Church, Sydney. Other nominees were withdrawn at the request of the nominees. Rev. Mr. Boothroyd was then unanimously chosen as president of the Maritime Conference for the term 1942-43. The new president was escorted to the platform by Rev.

Gasoline Rationing

Rev. C. A. M. Earle presented a memorial from the Moncton Presbytery re the rationing of gasoline for rural ministers. Many of these cover large territories in their very essential work and the curtailment of their gasoline ration is seriously hindering that work. The conference authorized that an approach be made to the proper authorities asking to remedy the situation.

The committee of religious education presented its report under the leadership of Rev. C. N. Brown, Campbellton. He expressed for the committee their appreciation of the report of W. S. Godfrey, secretary of religious education for the Maritimes. The chairman, while mentioning many encouraging features of the work, also presented a serious situation. There had been a marked decrease in the number of teachers and pupils.

In the Maritime Conference there are 793 United Church Sunday schools with 5,080 teachers and officers and 136,597 pupils. One encouraging feature of the report was an increase of pupils entering the full membership of the church. The total was 1,263.

In Sunday school work there had been a 10 per cent decline in the past five years of teachers and officers and of 14 per cent in the number of pupils. This decline has taken place while the number of families under pastoral care has increased. He recommended that the church co-operate in a four-year advance movement. The movement has six clear goals, the reaching of every person, the providing of adequate teaching staff, the creating of a working fellowship of leaders, the improvement of teaching material, and the bringing of all pupils into a personal commitment to Christ and His Church.

Rev. G. W. Myers, the secretary of religious education for the United Church of Canada, addressed the conference on the central place of religious education in the life of the Christian church. Rev. Dr. E. H. Ramsay, Saint John, spoke on the subject of the committee's work in promoting Christian instruction in the public schools.
