AN IMPORTANT INDUSTRY.

New Building Erected by the International Ice and Storage Company—Machinery Installed for Pasteurizing Milk.

The International Ice & Storage Co. in this city has installed in connection with its ice making plant a full and up-to-date set of machinery for clarifying and Pasteurizing milk, and for bottling it for sale, also for the manufacturing of creamery butter and ice cream. The company has erected at considerable expense a new building according to the latest details of requirements for a modern dairy. Nothing has been spared to accomplish the purpose and the public are invited to visit it and see the milk being put through its several processes. A gallery has been put in the main building, where each operation can be seen.

1st—The reception and testing of the milk for its acidity.

2nd—The milk passing through the clarifier by which it is cleaned of all impurities, such as dust, dirt, etc., etc., as also any foul odors.

3rd—From the clarifier, it passes through the Pasteurizer, by which all disease germs are destroyed if any are contained, such as tubercle, typhoid, scarlet fever, diphtheria, etc.

4th—When properly Pasteurized this milk is bottled in sterilized bottles with every regard for cleanliness.

5th—These bottles are then stored in a cold room specially prepared, from which they are delivered to the customers by the milk wagons.

The milk is procured from farmers, who engage to observe strict cleanliness, not only in handling the cows, but also in and around their barns, as also in milking and cooling the milk. The new dairy building is well worth a visit. It is on Gore avenue. It is 45x70 and two and a half stories in height. It is a frame building on a stone foundation painted white throughout. The lower story is used for making and storing ice, the upper story and a half has a cement floor throughout, and is divided into several rooms for various purposes.

The milk on being received and tested is at once pumped up into the receiving vat from which it gravitates over the clarifier, where it is thoroughly cleaned into the Pasteurizer, where all germ life is destroyed, thence it goes to the bottling machine, and from there it is stored in the cold room. The cream is handled in the butter room, which adjoins the milk room. The cream is Pasteurized before it is received in the cream vat, preparatory to churning, and thus a quality of butter, not equalled in the Province, is produced. This process of Pasteurizing preserves the milk, cream and butter for a long time, so there is no souring, if reasonable care is exercised.

The operators in both milk and butter rooms are clothed in clean, white sterilized cotton, and every care in cleanliness is observed. The bottles are received in the washing room where, after being thoroughly brushed and washed through several waters, they are placed in a sterilizing tank and raised to a high temperature in order to secure perfect safety. This process is of the utmost importance and is watched carefully.

There is no better equipped plant in the Dominion than this one, and the directors look with confidence to the people of Vancouver to support them in this enterprise and endeavor to supply a much needed want in the form of good, clean, healthy milk and butter, Vancouver World.
