RATIFICATION OF WATERWAYS TREATY SOUGHT

Roosevelt Discusses St. Lawrence Scheme With Waterways Men.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20.—(A.P.)—A chain of waterways encircling the eastern half of the United States, with the Mississippi and St. Lawrence-Great Lakes systems as major links, was charted today at a conference between President Roosevelt and waterway proponents.

Authorizes Huge Expenditure

The President has authorized a \$20,000,000 expenditure for improvement of navigation and flood control in the Mississippi River system.

LEIPZIG, Germany, Sept. 20.—(A.P.)—Preparations were complete tonight for the beginning of the trial tomorrow of five men charged with setting fire to the Reichstag building last February, shortly before the election which strengthened the position of Chancellor Adolf Hitler and his Nazi party.
