THE ABSOLUTE NEED
OF A STRAITS TUNNEL

Urged By J. A. Messervy Of Carvell, Rattenbury & Messervy--He Says Act, Act At Once, Let Not A Moment Be Lost--Some Benefits To Be Derived.

The question of the building of a tunnel across Northumberland Straits is one that has risen to paramount importance during the present winter among the people of this province.

The press and public men have advocated the construction of such a work, if it can be proven feasible, and immediate action in pressing our claims upon the Dominion Government has been urged.

The Guardian Saturday waited upon J. A. Messervy of the firm of Carvell, Rattenbury & Messervy to ascertain his views, as a prominent business man and Ex President of the Board of Trade, upon the question.

"The whole province now must agree" he said in answer to a question as to the immense importance of the work, "that the Dominion Government will only justly carry out the terms of Union by connecting the Province with the mainland by a tunnel. Some personal interests will, of course, suffer but party and personal interests must not be considered when the whole population is to be benefited.

"Since a tunnel across the Straits has been opened in Italy this Island tunnel seems quite feasible and the Dominion Government should employ the services of expert engineers to report at once. If no engineer can be found on this side of the Atlantic with sufficient knowledge of these great works, experts on the other side who have had to do with the construction of similar works should be employed.

"Now [is the time to act, at once, while the Dominion Government is in session at Ottawa].

Mr Messervy suggested that at a meeting of the Board of Trade be called and merchants and prominent men be brought together throughout the Province to give their views.

The different Boards of Trade of the Island with the City Councils of Charlottetown, Summerside, Halifax and St. John and the three local governments should be represented on a committee to wait on the Maritime members and Senators at Ottawa and have them urge upon the Federal Government the absolute necessity of this undertaking.

This matter is one of vital importance to P. E. I. and consequently the benefits would be shared in by Nova Scotia and New Brunswick as well. All three Provinces should thus unite and act at once in a determined effort. "We must wake up to our interests," Mr Messervy said, "agitate now, as it will take eight or ten years at least to build."

Speaking of the enormous advantages that would result from a connecting link with the mainland under the Straits, Mr Messervy pointed out the immense saving in freight and passenger rates and also in the subsidies paid and large expense in connection with the winter steamers.

A tunnel would be a great advertisement to bring tourists to the Province as well. The fresh fish industry which this winter has been practically ruined, would flourish and be of immense value. Hours of travelling would be saved throughout Canada and the United States.

If we had a tunnel much of the delay of the present winter on account of snow would be obviated, for then our railway line would be kept open, if at all possible, and trains run night and day to do this as has been the case on the I. C. R.

Another strong argument advanced by Mr Messervy and one that will appeal to every land owner in Prince Edward Island is this: Land values would increase and it would be no unusual thing to see what is now worth \$50 rise to \$200 thus tripling or quadrupling the property value of every real estate owner. New industries would spring up, and thousands of new jobs would be created.

Speaking of a third winter steamer, Mr Messervy urged the building this coming summer of a third winter steamer, as powerful and as large as the one now plying on the Straits of MacInnac between Lake Michigan and Lake Huron, which gives daily communication and carries freight and passenger cars. Though the tunnel should be begun at once this steamer will be necessary for ten years.

Dealing with the western route, Mr Messervy felt strongly in favor of a steamer being placed at the disposal of Prince County to keep up communication the year around between Summerside and some point on the mainland. Then there will be two on the eastern route and one on the western route thus giving the best possible service at the present time for all sections of the Province.

At Vernon River Hall—An excellent entertainment is being provided for the people of Vernon River and the surrounding country in the C. M. B. A. Hall on St. Patrick's night March 17th. On that date, David Hill's thrilling drama, "The Mountain King" will be presented by local talent. The play is a strong one depicting the noble as well as the passionate side of human nature. It opens in the home of Malvin Shortwell in the city of Denver. "Doc" Brady enters and carries off his wife and child. The scene changes to the miners' camps in the Rocky mountains where the child was carried. The rough yet honest hearts of the miners are humorously portrayed. The tragic scenes between Shortwell and "Doc" Brady are subjects of the deepest excitement. Lacy, the prospector, strikes it rich as far as gold is concerned but he is rather nervous about making a strike for the hand of the Mountain King. He succeeds however by a "lift" from one of his friends. There are five acts in the drama which will require something over two hours for rendition, but from the opening till the curtain falls in the last act there is not a dull feature. The company have been rehearsing this play since the beginning of the New Year, and a competent judge who was present one evening reported there was no doubt of its success. The stage in the hall has been elaborately fitted up for the occasion. It will be worth your while to have a seat in Vernon River Hall at 7.45 p. m. on the 17th inst. 6d 3f

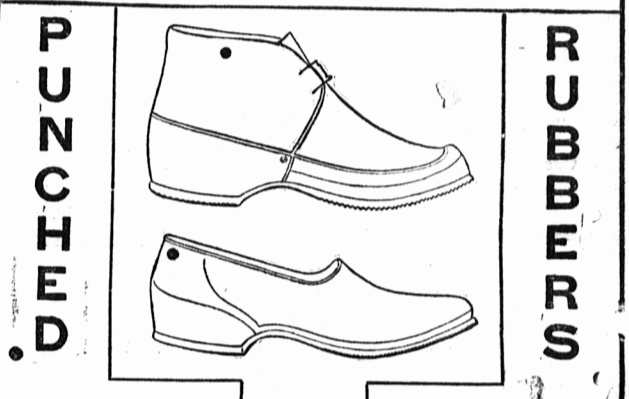
