Annual Meeting Of The United Baptist Ass'n.

The 70th annual Association of the Island Baptist Churches convened with the O'Leary Baptist Church on June 24th to 27th. The devotional addresses were given by Rev. H. R. Bell, Rev. J. W. Hayter and Rev. George Hovey—the services of song were led by Rev. J. Gordon Duncan, assisted by the O'Leary Choir. The digest of Church Letters, Sunday School Reports and Young Peoples Societies were given by the Clerk, Rev. J. B. Wilson, and the reports showed a very successful year, both spiritually and financially. Though losing a great number of valued members and workers during the past year, numerous additions were made by baptism and by letter. All the churches were represented by Pastors and delegates, and an optimistic note prevailed and all look forward to the new Church year with great expectations.

The work of the educational institutions comprising Acadia University was presented by the Field Secretary, Rev. Earl Kinley. Mr. C. B. Jelly, Principal of the Summerside High School presided over the meeting held in the High School Auditorium on Monday evening, at which Mrs. H. B. Newcombe of Halifax expressed her views on temperance, alcohol and law enforcement to a small but appreciative audience.

Mrs. Newcombe is a gifted speaker and stressed the great need in the world today of temperance. She spoke very strongly on the growing toll of deaths by motor vehicles through, not the drunken driver, but the person who has had but one or two glasses of beer.

She said everyone should strive to combat the evil through education the people along scientific lines; adult education was a good move and is doing much to forward the temperance movement.

Mrs. Newcombe complimented the Island people on the stand they have taken on the temperance question and by so doing have set an example to the whole world.

On the platform were Rev. Mr. Henderson of Toronto, Rev. L. E. G. Davies, Summerside, and Mr. Allison Profit, President of the Temperance Union of Prince Edward Island. These gentlemen spoke briefly before Mrs. Newcombe gave her address.

Plan For Bigger Wembley Stadium LONDON, June 29—Of three important proposals before the English Football Association two were thrown out and the third is being considered. At the annual meeting here officials voted against trying a two-referee system and also against a proposal to relegate and promote four teams instead of two. They approved consideration of a plan to provide for the accommodation of 40,000 more spectators at the Wembley Stadium where the cup finals are played. The match between Sunderland and Preston North End May 1 was witnessed by 93 persons and thousands were unable to get seats. The cost of the plan would be \$300,000 and the burden would fall on the Football Association which would be recouped over a period of years. Other proposals seeking increased fees for referees and linesmen and a fund for third division clubs were lost but the association voted increases of talent money to players of the leading teams in each division.

The Football League season of 1937-1938 will be a week longer than last with 37 Saturdays instead of 36. It begins the last Saturday in August and ends the first Saturday in May.
