Five Deaths In Nova Scotia Over Week End

HALIFAX, Dec. 30.—Death strode up and down Nova Scotia over the Christmas week end, claiming five lives, revealing the body of a sixth man, and causing injury to six other persons.

Drownings accounted for two of the deaths, bootleg liquor, a fight, a fall on an icy pavement, and a train's wheels for the others.

A long-standing grudge ended in a pistol wounding, an exploding Christmas toy endangered the eyesight of three children, an attempted rope-walking act left the would-be acrobat with two broken ankles, and a samaritan dispensing Christmas cheer was taken from his wrecked car to hospital with a fractured limb.

What is claimed to be the first removal intact of an entire frescoed wall was carried out last week in the Church of Donnarregina in Naples, Italy. The wall thus moved weighs some 60 tons and has a surface of about 70 square yards, which is covered by the first great mural decoration of Francesco Solimena, painted in tempera in the second half of the seventeenth century.

The removal became necessary when it was decided to restore the apse of the original Gothic church which had been trenced upon in the seventeenth century to make room for the enlargement in the baroque style of the choir of the adjacent church. As Solimena's work had been carried out in tempera the fresco could not be detached from its wall (as was done, for example, with Leonardo's "Last Supper" in Milan), and it was feared that the wall and the fresco would have to be sacrificed.

Professor Cherici, however, undertook to move the wall bodily. The preparations took several months. The fresco was carefully covered, the wall was cut through, and a complicated system of scaffolding and supports erected. The actual moving back of the wall for more than 20 feet was completed in less than half an hour by means of hand-worked windlasses.

Faith has become in many lives little more than a convention while it should be giving birth to adventurous thought and action. There is no way into full communion with the purpose of God except through severe discipline of mind and heart. The Mission therefore contemplates a movement of deep and serious thoughtfulness. In due time you will hear from your pastors of plans for this simultaneous Mission for the Evangelization of Canadian Life.

With all earnestness we appeal to you to arrange your programme of life that the first week in the New Year shall be set apart for sustained intercession for your Church, your Nation and the World, that God may draw men in all nations into Christian discipleship. Deepen the spiritual life of the faithful, and direct our present enterprise to the glory of His name and the extension of His Kingdom in the hearts and lives of men and in all the relationships of their daily life.
