**EARNSCLIFFE.**—The Earnscliffe Red Cross Society knit 148 pairs of socks for the soldiers, and sent 2 parcels overseas since November 1917 since 1916 as incorrectly stated. While Mr. Lewis Hayden was driving up the street Tuesday, leading a horse he had taken in to sell, two troopers came up behind, stepped on the horse's hooves, this frightened the white horse behind, causing him to rear. Coming down his hoof caught in the spokes of the wagon wheel and smashed it to pieces. Mr. Hayden fortunately escaped himself without an injury. Mr. Charles Young, son of W. Young, Pownal, formerly of Earnscliffe, is farming in Cardston, Alberta, and has ninety acres under wheat. He is the only Islander on Wednesday's lists of Canadian casualties which include six killed in action, eight died of wounds, three died, one wounded and missing, one missing, one prisoner of war, 129 wounded, 6 gassed and 22 ill.  
**POLICE NEWS.**—Several military deserters rounded up by the military authorities were lodged in the police station on Saturday, and will be dealt with by the military authorities. **NEW STEAMER COMING.**—The Halifax Herald says: Charles Brewster and son will operate their new steamer Roseina B. as a coal carrier between Louisbourg and Charlottetown during the summer and after discharging the load she brought to Halifax yesterday from Louisbourg will proceed to the Cape Breton port to begin her new service which will help out conditions to a considerable extent at the Island capital next winter. The Roseina B. will average about four hundred tons coal a trip.  
**DIED IN VANCOUVER.**—Mr. George A. W. Robertson, City, has received a telegram from his son Grantham of Vancouver, B. C., conveying the sad news of the sudden death of Mr. W. P. Hayden in Vancouver. The telegram states that no particular cause had been received at the time of writing. Mr. Hayden was a native of this city, son of the late Mr. Alex. Hayden and left the province some twenty-five years ago. He leaves to mourn his daughters. The late Mr. Hayden had a number of relatives in this province, Col. Moore and Mr. John A. Moore, being first cousins.
